

STATE CONSIDERS 53 PETROLEUM CODE ORDERS

Fifty-three petroleum orders were considered for reorganization or removal from the state's oil and gas code during a public hearing before the oil advisory board in the House of Representatives' chambers on September 18, the conservation department notes.

Spokane orders, some of which have been in effect since 1940, were discussed and, where necessary, those that are out-of-date were eliminated. The constantly changing nature of the petroleum industry makes necessary an occasional review of these rules.

Gerald E. Eddy, department director and state supervisor of wells, will act on each of the orders after considering findings of the advisory board.

TIPS OFFERED ON PREPARING FREEZER CORN

Poods and nutrition specialists at Michigan State College give these rules for harvesting and preparing sweet corn for the home freezer.

Harvest the corn early in the morning. Select ears with well-filled, rounded kernels and sweet flavor. Avoid hard and immature kernels. Handle quickly to preserve quality and flavor.

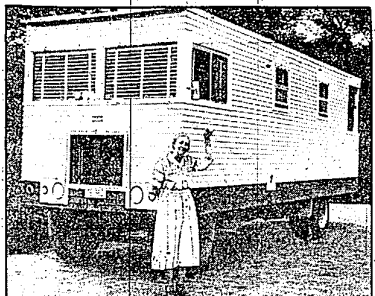
It's best to process within two or three hours of harvesting. If it is necessary to hold over night, keep corn in the refrigerator or in cracked ice. The MSC specialists advise harvesting and preparing small quantities of corn at a time in order to handle it promptly so that it is frozen at the peak of condition.

Prepare by husking, silking and trimming the ears. Blanch on the cob for cut or cream style.

For cut corn: Blanch 4 minutes, cool quickly and cut from the cob. For cream style: Blanch 4 minutes, cool quickly and scrape off cob.

For corn on the cob: Blanch 8 to 10 minutes and cool quickly. (The longer blanching time is required to inactivate enzymes in both kernels and cob which otherwise would damage flavor and color of the frozen product.)

All three types are frozen in dry packs.

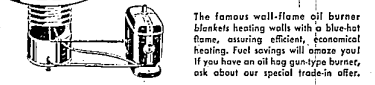

State Raccoons Increase Despite Disease Reports

Michigan's raccoons seem to be bearing up under the strain of their higher-than-usual population, the conservation department reports.

Earlier this year, a number of raccoons were reported from the field infected with a distemper-like disease. Several were autopsied at the department's pathological laboratories in Lansing, but positive identification of the infecting virus could not be made.

Biologists feared at that time that such a disease might spread rapidly through the coon population, but to date only a few additional cases have been reported.


