

### CANCER FINDINGS BEING PROJECTED AT EAST LANSING

Research which may add to our understanding of the means of controlling cancer is being conducted at Michigan State College in a study of the "building blocks" of animal life.

Significant findings in a project spanning the past two years have been made by an MISC research team headed by Dr. Alfred Novak, associate professor of natural science. Sponsor is the Surgeon General's office of the U. S. Public Health Service.

The major structural material of body tissue is protein. Dr. Novak explains. Making up the protein molecule are smaller units, or "building blocks", called amino acids.

Unlike the building blocks of a man-made structure, human building blocks are constantly being replaced. By "marking" these blocks with radioactive material, their turn-over can be studied with the help of a Geiger counter, the war-developed instrument highly sensitive to radio-activity.

"If some agent can be found that would slow up the process of amino acids building up cancerous tissue — thus shutting off the cancerous growth without affecting normal tissue — a means of controlling cancer would be at hand," Dr. Novak declares.

Radioactive amino acids are being used in Dr. Novak's laboratory to find out what happens to the acids when injected into an animal's body under normal conditions, and what happens when the animal is under treatment with such hormones as ACTH, male hormones and growth hormones.

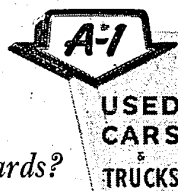
