

The Clarenceville Trojans Were Ahead But...



Mustang Eleven Comes From Behind To Win Thriller By 20-19 Score

The Clarenceville Trojans suffered their first defeat of the season last Friday, October 9, when they bowed to the Northville Mustangs 20-19.

The game opened with Ed Gilmore kicking off to the Northville 11 yard line. Lamar Valley of the Mustangs ran the ball back to the Trojan 15 yard marker. Then the suburban Trojan line took over and held the Mustangs without a gain on three plays and forced them to punt.

The Trojans took over on their own 29 yard line and, on runs by Bill Meyers, Ed Gilmore and Clay Robbins, moved the ball 70 yards to the Northville one, from where Glenn Reed scored on a quarterback sneak. The try for extra point was no good, so the score was Clarenceville 6 - Northville 0.

Then, in the remaining part of the first period and all of the second period, the tide seemed to change as the Mustangs drove over the goal once in each quarter to make the score Northville 12 - Clarenceville 6.

In the third quarter the teams battled back and forth but could not score. However, in the final period the Trojans caught fire and moved the ball to the Mustang 6 yard line, from where Bill Meyers trotted into the end zone for the Trojan score. Ed Gilmore took over the extra point to make the score 13-12.

After the touchdown, Ed Gilmore of the Trojans kicked off to the Mustang 29 yard line where they fumbled and Clarenceville recovered. On the first play, Clay Robbins ran off tackle and went all the way for the touchdown. The try for extra point was no good and the Trojans led 19-12.

Then the Mustangs dug in and tried to protect their six point lead, but with 26 seconds left in the game the Mustangs clicked on a pass play from the 15 yard line to make the score 19-19. For their extra point the Mustangs faked a kick and ran the ball over to make the score Northville 20, Clarenceville 19.

Falcons Falter Before S'field 7-0 On Friday

Rice's Passing Marks Offense Bright Spot

Farmington High's football team lost its ball game 7-0 to Southfield last Friday at Southfield.

In the first quarter J. Simmons kicked off to Southfield with D. West of Farmington returning the ball to the 37 yard line of Farmington. After gaining little on two running plays, J. Rice completed a pass to J. Fawcett for 10 yards to the Southfield 20 for a first down. A running play and a short pass from Rice to Dryden gained five yards. On the fourth down D. Bradley of Southfield intercepted Rice's pass to end Farmington's scoring threat.

Southfield failed to move the ball on their first series of plays from scrimmage so Simmons was forced to kick. Goulet brought the ball back to the Farmington 40. Farmington employed a spread formation, leaving Rice in the backfield by himself. A pass from Rice to D. Robinson was good for 25 yards but here their attack was halted. Fawcett's kick was blocked. Southfield recovering on the 50.

On the third try D. Bradley yarded for a first down on the 33 yard line. A pass from J. Rush caught F. Courville in the end zone for a touchdown. Simmons converted the extra point, making the score 7-0.

Farmington fought back with passes from Rice to Dryden and Robinson, but a clipping penalty against Farmington ended the attack. An exchange of punts ended the first half.

The second half was a battle between Southfield's defense and Farmington's offense. Farmington advanced to within 15 yards of the Southfield goal twice but had clipping penalties called on both occasions to end the advance.

During the second half Rice continued to connect on passes to Dryden, Fawcett and Robinson and Co-Captain Tim Thomas turned in several fine runs but the Falcons could not find the sustained power to reach the Southfield goal line.

The Falcons met Waterford on October 16 for their annual homecoming game.

U. Of Detroit Boasts Denny McCotter As All-Around 60 Minute Player

Single platoon football may cut down the number of specialists, but the new system may bring back the type of player which is so familiar to baseball, that is the "utility man." This is the player who may find himself shifted from position to position whenever the situation arises.

At the University of Detroit, the Titans have just such a player, and he is probably one of the best "utility men" in college football.

He is captain Denny McCotter, a 215 pounder who has done practically everything there is to do in his three years with the Titans. He has kicked, he has passed, he has received, he has carried, the ball for long touchdown runs and he is presently doing a terrific job as a guard and linebacker on Detroit's powerful line.

"Had I moved Denny to guard two years ago and kept him there he would have been an All-American today," said Titan coach Dutch Clark. Denny began his college football career as a quarterback on the 1951 varsity. That year he led the team in forward passing, as a sophomore among four quarterbacks, with a total of 276 yards gained passing and two touchdowns passed. He also had a rushing record of 185 yards in 42 tries for a 4.5 average besides scoring two touchdowns.

As a junior he was shifted to fullback because of his powerful running abilities and because a fellow by the name of Teddy Marchbroda took over the quarterback's role. After three games Coach Clark found him in a desperate need of a linebacker in order to bolster the team's poor defensive showing and also to make room for Ray Zambiasi, who

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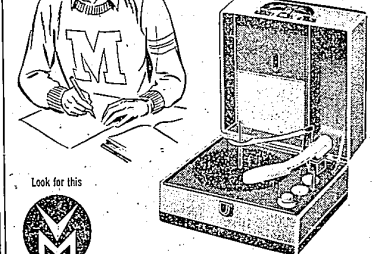
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
