## GERMAN STUDENTS DISCUSS VIEWS BEFORE BOND SCHOOL P.T.A. MEETING

Two German exchange students held the spotlight on October 19 at the regular meeting of the Bond School P. T. A. when they gave their newly-acquired impressions of the United States.

Their appearance before the Bond School audience was expressly timely in view of the fact that it occurred during United Nations Week. Their students, Klara Volkhoff of West Berlin and Andviktoria Schmidt of Frankfurt, are members of the United Nations exchange student program.

Volkhoff is a student at Walld Lake and Schmidt is now studying at Northville.

Both students explained the manner in which they had been chosen to represent their country in the United States and each assured the audience that he believed the exchange program a fine method of bringing about a better understanding between nations.

The German students stated that they must maintain satisfactory marks or they are subject to being dropped from the exchange agreement at the end of the sixth grade. The boys may not engage in outside activities other than what is connected with their school work.

Both Volkhoff and Schmidt agreed that the United States is just as they had been told it would be.

The only discrepancy was voiced by Volkhoff who said that American movies give the impression that all you have to do is pick up money.

The two students stated that their most difficult task has been in understanding the "hep" language used by the boys and girls in this country.

## Unusual Program Set For Oct. 24 On Game Of Week

### Schedule Panoramic View Of Four Games

One of the most unusual telecasts in the history of TV coverage of sports will take place Saturday afternoon, October 24, when portions of four college football games being played in different sections of the country will be seen over the national NBC network as the TV Game of Week.

The history-making panoramic telecast will include parts of the following games: Princeton vs. Cornell at Princeton, New Jersey; Mississippi vs. Arkansas at Memphis, Tennessee; Illinois vs. Syracuse at Champaign, Illinois; and Iowa vs. Indiana at Iowa City.

Telecast time will be 2:45 p.m., Eastern Standard Time.

The panoramic telecast is designed to afford more football fans an opportunity to see their favorite team in action. Another panoramic telecast of four games is scheduled for Saturday, November 7. Briefly, here is how the panoramic telecast will work:

Each of the four games will be covered in its entirety by a full crew of NBC cameramen. Each game also will be described play-by-play by a gamecast announcer. All four telecasts will be fed into a central station in Chicago, where NBC's Mel Allen and Lindsay Nelson will be ready to correlate the game-to-game switches.

The camera men, gamecasters, announcers and technicians in the Chicago station will have four television screens in front of them at all times, each carrying a different game.

In addition, the Chicago group will be in constant telephonic contact with the television producer and announcer at each of the four game sites. Thus, when there is to be a change from Game A to Game B, the announcer at Game B will be alerted by telephone and informed when he goes on the air so that he can quickly explain the play situation to the millions of television viewers who will be looking in on the game. trial of each person or persons.

II. Any person or persons engaged in selling Christmas Trees within the limits of this ordinance, at the close of the selling season, remove all unsold trees, branches and other debris not related to such sales.

Section 20. FIRE EQUIPMENT AND APPARATUS REQUIRED. Every mercantile and manufacturing establishment, school, place of public assembly, hospital, place of detention, hotel, theatre, auditorium, lodge hall, commercial premises and other places where persons are allowed to congregate shall provide such premises with such fire escapes, fire detecting fire alarm system and fire prevention and fire fighting equipment and apparatus as shall be established by the rules and regulations of the Commissioner of the State Police under the provisions of the state "Fire prevention act" adopted and made a part of this ordinance.

Section 21. MANUFACTURE OF EXPLOSIVES. The manufacture of explosives, except small arms ammunition within the City is prohibited.

Section 22. DRY CLEANING AND DYEING PLANTS. ADOP- TION BY REFERENCE OF STATUTE.

A. Under authority of Section 7 of Chapter 7 of the Charter of the City of Farmington, all provisions of Act No. 327 of Michigan Public Acts of 1947, as amended, and any amendments hereafter made thereto, applying to dry cleaning and dyeing plants, are hereby adopted, enacted and made a part of this ordinance.

B. Violation of any provision of the state law above referred to in this paragraph shall constitute a violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

C. Section 23. DOWLING ALLEYS. A. ALLEY RESURFACING OPERATIONS. Resurfacing operations shall not be carried on while the establishment is open for business. The Chief of the Fire Department shall be notified when such work is to be done.

CLEAN RUGS IMMEDIATELY.

Spots on rugs should be removed immediately. Advise home management specialists at Michigan State College. A safe, non-inflammable cleaner can be used to remove grease. Give spots due to ink and other liquids immediate attention.

Spread blotting paper torn in bits - - - or cornmeal, cornstarch or talcum powder - - - over the stain while still wet to absorb it.

er device commonly used and sold as fireworks containing lead, arsenic, mercury, nitroglycerine, phosphorus or any compound containing any of the same or other modern explosives, except toy pistol paper caps which contain 1/4 grain, or less, of explosive mixture, and except sparklers containing not more than .0125 pounds of burning powder per sparkler. Provided, That the council may, upon application in writing, grant a permit for a public display of fireworks for any civic, charitable or religious body or other association when such display is handled by a competent operator. After such permit shall have been granted, sales, possession or transportation of fireworks for such display may be made for that purpose only. Provided further, That nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit any wholesale resident dealer or jobber to have in his possession, transport or sell at wholesale, such fireworks as he may wish to stock on hand for sale of any kind of fireworks when the same are to be shipped directly out of the state; or the possession, transportation or sale or use of blank cartridges for a show or theatre or for signal purposes in athletic events or by railroads for signal purposes or for use by the militia.

Section 25. PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS.

A. Any person who shall violate or attempt to violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or any rule or regulation made hereunder, or who shall act in violation of any permit issued thereunder, or who shall prevent or interfere with any person in the discharge of his duty under this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not less than Five and no/100 (\$5.00) Dollars, nor more than Five Hundred and no/100 (\$500.00) Dollars, together with the costs of prosecution thereof, and in default of the payment of such fine and costs may be imprisoned for a period not to exceed ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

B. The imposition of one penalty for any violation of this ordinance shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within the time stated in any notice thereof; and when no time is stated, then within a reasonable time; and when otherwise specified, each ten days that any such conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 27. REPEAL. Ordinance C-25-49 is hereby repealed. This Ordinance was enacted at a Regular Meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington on October 19, 1953, and will become effective on November 8th, 1953. Motion carried, all yeas.
