

## Trojans Move Fast To Hand Holly 13-0 Setback

Trojans yardage but they were unable to score until the fourth quarter, when they racked up 13 points to shut out their rivals.

The Clarencville Trojans scored two touchdowns in the final period to win the annual Homecoming game from Holly 13-0. The game got under way with Ed Gilmore kicking off to the Holly 17 yard line. The ball was carried back to the 21 where a host of Trojan tacklers swarmed over the Holly runner to bring him down. Then, with first down and ten yards to go on the Holly 21, the Trojan defense took over and pushed Holly back three yards in three plays to make it fourth down and 13 to go on the 15.

On the fourth down Holly punted to the Trojan 29. The Trojans then took over and, behind the signal calling of Glenn Reed, moved steadily to the Holly four.

Clay Robbins plunged over the goal but the play was called back because of a Trojan offside. Then, with second down and goal to go on the nine yard line, Bill Myers scooted around right end into the end zone, but again a penalty nullified the score.

Clarencville and Holly battled back and forth for the remainder of the half and at intermission the score was 0-0.

The final period began with a first down and goal to go on the 9 yard line. Bill Myers scored after Clay Robbins had moved the ball to the 4. Gilmore's kick was good and C. H. S. led 7-0.

The Trojans kicked off to Holly and after three plays Ed Gilmore battered a Holly pass into the hands of Mel Koch and again the Trojans took possession. This time Clarencville was held and Holly took over on downs. After that a see-saw battle developed. With only a minute and a half remaining in the game the Trojans moved

to the Holly 11 from where Ed Gilmore's try for a field goal hit the cross bar and bounced back. Holly took over on the 20 and on the first play Pat Killeen, Bob Crose and Jim Galloway trapped the Holly quarterback on the two while trying to pass. The rest of the play saw Holly fall back to within two inches of the goal as the whole Trojan line swarmed on the runner. With time for only one more play the Holly quarterback elected to throw a pass. Tom Rutilla, Trojan line backer, intercepted the pass and lateralized to Bill Myers, who raced into the end zone. Gilmore's kick again hit the cross bar and the game ended with Clarencville out in front 13-0. Dick Woods, Trojan offensive center, was lost for the season with a dislocated shoulder.

The Farmington Falcons kept their losing streak alive last Friday night by falling to Walled Lake 13-0.

Tim Thomas, Farmington co-captain, elected to receive to begin the game. Dick Condit took the opening kick-off and ran it back to the 24. A series of Farmington plays were halted by the Vikings and John Pawcett was forced to kick from his own 25.

After Farmington took the kick-off, Pawcett carried the first play from scrimmage for no gain. Dick Ainsworth then carried through the middle for one yard before a pass from Jerry Rice to Don Robinson was incomplete.

Walled Lake took over at the mid-field and once again started to threaten. Three running plays gave Walled Lake a first down on Farmington's 39. The Vikings were finally stopped when Bob Byrne intercepted a pass on the 20.

At that point the half ended with Walled Lake out in front 6-0.

Walled Lake took the kick-off at the beginning of the second half and ran it back to the 45. Farmington's line held and Walled Lake was forced to kick for the first time. Goulet let the ball roll to Farmington's five yard line. Three Falcon plays failed and Pawcett had to kick again. After rolling up two quick first downs, Walled Lake scored on a pass play. The kick was good and the score became 13-0.

Farmington started moving the ball well in the last quarter. After they took the kick-off, Rice passed to John McCaffrey for 11 yards and a first down on the 48. Rice then passed 31 yards to Thomas on the 18 but Walled Lake held the Falcons from moving.

Farmington plays Berkley tomorrow on the Falcon gridiron.

## WILCOX CUTS TROJAN TRACK RUNNING MARK

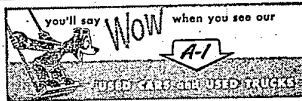

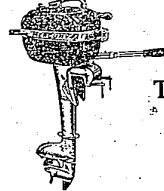

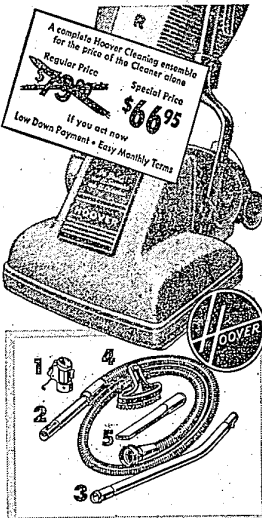
