## An Aggressive . . .

and hard-hitting campaign is being launched in an ef-fort to eliminate township type of government in the

fort to eliminate township type of government in the State of Michigan.

This campaign is backed up with facts and figures directed mainly at the financial aspects. The information compiled by the anti-township group can not be denied as far as it goes. Much of the financial difficulty now being experienced by the state is undoubtedly due to the Sales Tax Diversion Amendment. Most of the attention has been directed at townships because in many cases they are leaving no local tax

because in many cases they are levying no local tax while piling up sizeable reserves. However, while this may exist in many cases, we do not believe that it is just cause for abolishing township government. In the wild scramble to straighten out the financial situation, many have forgotten the basic reason for forwiship government manuful repreout the financial situation, many have forgotten the basic reason for township government, namely representation close to the people. The anti group points out instances of politics in township government. If we are going to throw out township government because of that ... what about cities, counties, and even the state? Townships serve as a local agency, where citizens can go to register complaints and demand that things be done. If they don't get the service they want and need, then they can and should elect officials who will take action.

As far as the financial aspects are concerned, townships should voluntarily turn sales tax monies into services which the people need. If no such need exists, the law should be changed so that the surplus money is put to use elsewhere. This would require new legislation, but so would the abolishment of township government. Townships must, of necessity, take positive and constructive action in correcting known weaknesses or they may loose their identity entirely.
