### Trojans Suffer Second Setback At Hands Of Keego Harbor Friday

The Clarencville Trojans suffered their second loss of the current season last Friday, November 8, bowing to Keego Harbor 14-0. The loss knucks the Trojans out of the league race, although they still have one more game to play with Brighton.

The game opened with Clarencville kicking off to Keego Harbor. Ed Gilmore kicked to the 13 yard stripe and Keego returned it to the 20. The Trojans held Keego on three plays and forced them to punt on fourth down. The Trojans took over in their own 29 yard line and promptly went for three first downs to the Keego nine where the drive fizzled and Keego took over on downs. In the remaining minutes of the quarter, Clarencville and Keego engaged in a see-saw battle which ended midway in the second quarter with Buck O'Shaughnessy, star halfback for Keego, drove over the goal line for the first Keego tally. The placement was good and Keego led 7-0.

Keego then kicked off to the Trojans. After an exchange of punts, the half ended with Keego still out in front 7-0. At the start of the second half, the Trojans again kicked off to Keego and after another exchange of punts, Keego moved to the 7 yard line of the Trojans where it was first down and goal to go. After being stopped on three plays, O'Shaughnessy crashed over from the one yard line on fourth down. The placement was again good and Keego led 14-0.

No scoring took place in the remaining minutes of the game, but the Trojans threatened twice in the last period, with their longest drive halting at the twelve yard line. In all the Trojans threatened four times, but could not manage to score. Keego, however, threatened three times, but failed to score on two of them to take the game 14-0.

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### Arrow Indicates Law Broken By Hunters

An arrow was found recently inside an 80-acre deer study pen at the Houghton Lake wildlife experiment station near Roseconum, the conservation department reports. The arrow was lodged in the ground at such an angle as to make workers believe archers have invaded the pen to hunt. America's television audience will watch a neighborhood grid battle of national importance Saturday afternoon, November 14, when the University of Michigan and Michigan State College meet at Mackin Field in the TV Football game of the Week.

The game, which will be seen over the nationwide NBC television network starting at 1:30 p.m., will pit two of the country's top college teams against each other in a game that will have much to do with the Big Ten conference standings as well as the national football ratings.

The matter of neighborhood supremacy, too, is important to these two schools, located some 60 miles apart in southern Michigan. So, with State, conference and national prestige riding on the outcome, Saturday's Michigan - Michigan State game is truly the Game of the Week.

Millions of television fans will join the sellout stadium crowd in watching the contest to make Saturday's TV Game of the Week the most looked at college football game ever played.

Last year, as a fullback, U. of M.'s Denny McCotter failed to score a point. Now converted to a guard, McCotter has two points to his credit via extra point conversions.

### FALCONS DEFEATED IN FINAL GAME BY BENTLEY 23-0

The lane Farmington Falcons lost their final game of the season last Friday to the Bentley Bulldogs, 23-0.

The Falcons were snowed under by a powerful running attack that Bentley had failed to get rolling in their previous games. The Bulldogs outplayed Farmington from the opening kickoff until the final gun. The Falcons were able to run up a grand total of two first downs compared to 14 for Bentley. The Bulldogs scored early in the first period on a 57 yard sustained march. They ran John McCaffrey's punt back to the 43. On the first play from scrimmage Jim Brewbaker and Bob Markham pushed the Bentley fullback for a two yard loss to the 41. On the next play the Bulldogs went wide with King picking up 20 yards. Three plays later they scored on a 60 yard delay of tackle. The try for the point after the touchdown was good.

After Bentley kicked off the Falcons picked up the first of their two first downs when Byrnes got wide and picked up 13 yards, picking up good blocking from Roger Goers and Brewbaker. Then after two running plays a pass from Markham to Tim Thomas was incomplete and Pawcett was forced to kick.

Bentley dominated the second period, scoring twice on sustained marches of 71 and 50 yards. The Falcons' defense couldn't do anything to break the quiet and accurate blocking of the Bulldog line.

Although there were no long runs to speak of, each team could be complimented on one thing, Bentley for its fine "down field" blocking and the Falcons secondary for a fine job of stopping a lot of plays that could have been touchdowns.

In the third period Farmington kicked off to Bentley. The Bulldogs took the kickoff and promptly marched to a touchdown. In the last few minutes of the game Coach Dye substituted freely with the freshmen and junior varsity. The starting offensive line-up for Farmington was: Tom Joley, senior, left end; Roger Goers, senior, co-captain, left tackle; Jim Brewbaker, senior, left guard; Ralph Porter, senior, center; Charles Crumhart, junior, right guard; Dennis Cannard, senior, right tackle; Wayne Dryden, senior, right end; John Pawcett, junior, quarterback; Bob Byrnes, junior, left halfback; Don Robinson, sophomore, fullback; and Tim Thomas, senior, co-captain, right halfback.

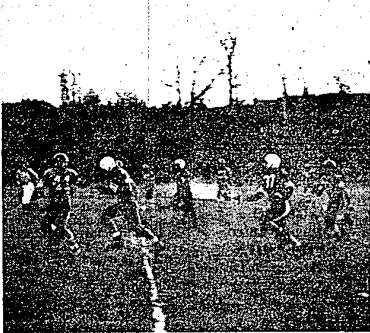

### DEER HUNTERS CAN REGISTER TO GET MESSAGES

The Michigan State Police and the State Conservation department again will offer a free registration service for deer hunters who desire to be notified in event an emergency occurs at home.

A hunter desiring to avail himself of the service should register at the State Police post or Conservation headquarters nearest his camp. Before leaving home he should inform his family or office in which station he will register. Should there be an emergency, those at home need only call their nearest State Police post or Conservation headquarters and give the name of the station at which the hunter is registered. The message will then be radioed and delivered by either a State Police or conservation officer.

### Michigan Counties Get Forest Receipt Shares

Twenty-six Michigan counties recently shared more than \$150,000 as their portion of national forest receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1963.

The largest single check, nearly \$27,000, went to Gogebic County for timber sold out of its 275,000 acres of Ottawa National forest, highest total national acreage of any county.

The smallest check went to Rosconum County - \$1,071 - for timber operations on its 40 acres of Huron national forest lands.
