While in Farmington he attended the commissioners' meeting in Nov. on November 4 with Barham and Gilson.




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

would necessitate an 8" or 12" line which would have to be extended from Liberty and Middlebelt to the school at an approximate cost of \$20,000.

Mr. Tupper feels that it would be more advantageous to the Board to take advantage of the Detroit source because there are homes in the area which would have water rights if the line was extended. This is in contrast to the Farmington extension which, because of limited water supply, could not serve homes along the line with city water.

Tupper said that he would obtain an estimate of the cost of extending the Detroit line and present the facts at the November 23 meeting of the Board.

In the event that the School Board decides to tie in to the Detroit source, it would be necessary to obtain the approval of the township and the City of Detroit.

The present water supply at Middlebelt is adequate but school officials say that it is un dependable in that the pumps might again draw silt into the filtering system. Such was the case last year when water was closed for several weeks and an emergency above-ground storage tank was utilized.
