Trojans Close 1953 Football Season Friday By Walloping Brighton Eleven 32 - 6

The Clarenceville Trojans ended their 1953 football season by walloping Brighton 32 - 6 on the Bulldogs' gridiron Friday. The victory put the Trojans in third place in the Wayne - Oakland County League. The Trojans, under the fine coaching of Nick Ianni, had their most successful season in six years, having won four, lost two and tied two.

The game started off with Brighton kicking off to Clarenceville. Bill Myers took the ball on the ten and carried it back to the 20 where he fumbled and Brighton recovered. After holding the Bulldogs on four plays, the Trojans took over on the 25 yard line and started a 15 yard drive which ended when Bill Myers was shot over from the one. Ed Gilmore's placement was good and Clarenceville led 7 - 0. Clarenceville then kicked off to the Bulldogs. Brighton's captain, Wayne Atkinson, received the ball on the 15 yard line. From there the Bulldogs drove to the Clarenceville 25, where they lost the ball on downs. The Trojans took over and moved the ball to the Bulldogs' 15 as the quarter ended.

In the second quarter Clarenceville drove the rest of the way to the goal as Clay Robbins kicked the line and went over standing up for the second Trojan score. Gilmore's kick was low and Clarenceville led 12 - 0. Clarenceville again kicked off to the Bulldogs. This time Brighton powered their way to the 35 yard line. With first down and ten to go, the Trojans caught the ball and forced the Bulldogs to punt. Bill Myers returned the punt on the 15 and returned it to the 35 yard line. On the next play Gilmore moved the ball on the 45 on an end run. With first and ten, Bill Myers ran 34 yards on a reverse play for Clarenceville's third touchdown. Gilmore's kick was good and Clarenceville led 20 - 0 as the half ended.

In the second half, Ed Gilmore kicked off to Brighton. The Trojans held the Bulldogs on three plays and forced them to punt. Clarenceville took over on the 14 and ruse by Gilmore. Michigan will play host to the tri-state fisheries meeting next year, with delegates expected from Minnesota and Wisconsin, the conservation department reports.

The 1953 annual meeting was held last week at Three Lakes, Wisconsin, and was attended by about 90 fisheries workers from the three states.

BYE-NOT TO BLAME FOR POOR SHOWING, F.H.S. PLAYER SAYS

A review of a football season that cannot exactly be called successful is easier to write, especially for a member of the squad.

There are several questions that should be cleared up. "Was this year's poor showing due to the Falcon coaching staff?" Definitely not! Head Coach Earl Bye did as much with this year's personnel as any coach could be expected to do.

Other students, faculty and townspeople have asked, "Did Coach Bye's system of the 'Split-T' formation have anything to do with the poor showing?
