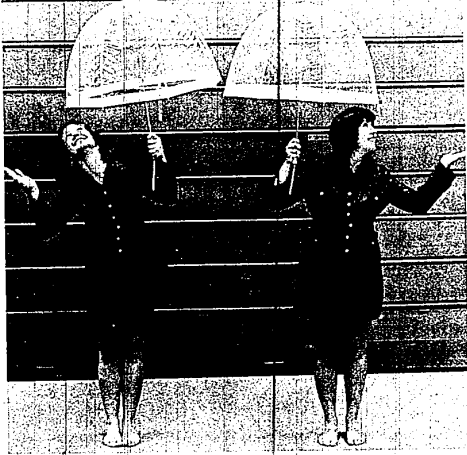
Roland and Emma Stock and children will be moving to Chicago soon. We wish them well and will miss them.
