The celebrated Columbus Boy Choir, directed by Herbert Huff, will give a concert at Detroit Town Hall Wednesday morning, December 3. Christmas carols will highlight the holiday note of the program, which will be presented at 11 o'clock in the Fisher Theatre.

Twenty-four boy singers, 9 to 14 years old, who were trained in the famous Columbus Boy Choir School, now located in Princeton, N. J., will sing a repertoire of popular and classical songs and also present "The Apothecary," a colorful one-act opera.

As a group, the Columbus Boy Choir singers have appeared with leading symphony orchestras and have performed over all major radio and television networks. The choir starred in the film, "America's Singing Boys."

Best-known of the choir's soloists is young Chet Allen, who played the lead in Gian-Carlo Menotti's "Amahl and the Night Visitors." Chet and three younger boys from the Boy Choir group, now assist Zola Pina on his weekly television program, "Mr. Don-ino."

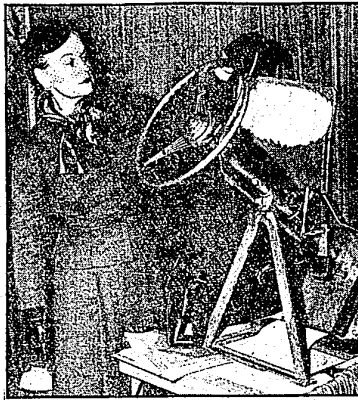
Donald Robinson, brother of the bride, served as best man.

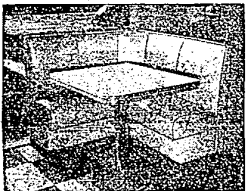
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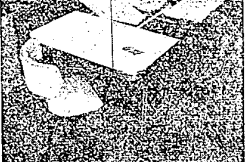


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
