'THE ROBE' NOW SHOWING IN PONTIAC

"The Robe" in CinemaScope, already hailed as a milestone in motion picture history, had its first opening in this area at the Oakland Theatre in Pontiac on Wednesday, December 9. The recent world premiere at the Roxy Theatre, New York, elicited the most extraordinary attention ever paid a movie since the advent of sound, accountable both for the subject—"The Robe" and the introduction of the new revolutionary process, CinemaScope. The new medium utilizes an anamorphic lens, stereoscopic sound and the new Miraflo Mirror screen to achieve vast dimension, life-like depth and hitherto unknown brilliance. Without being required to wear glasses, the viewer is said to be engaged by the picture he witnesses, in CinemaScope.

The selection of "The Robe", surely one of the most eagerly awaited properties in filmland's history, as the initial project for CinemaScope, was the masterstroke of 20th Century Fox and the film's producer, Frank Ross. Mr. Ross has cherished the aspiration of bringing "The Robe" to the screen ever since he purchased the film rights from the author of the widely-read novel, the late Lloyd C. Douglas, after reading the galley proofs some 12 years ago.
