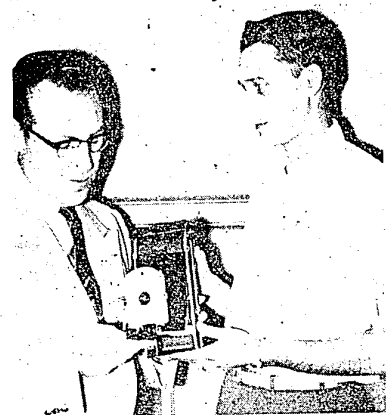


Wins Camera At Jaycee "Fun Bowl"

the nature of the accusation; the right to be confronted with the witnesses, and to have access to counsel. Article VII provides similar rights in civil cases according to the rules of the common law. Article VIII restricts bail to a reasonable amount and prohibits excessive fines and cruel and unusual punishments.

Article IX makes it clear that the Constitution points to certain rights specifically but that in so doing it does not deny or deprive other rights retained by the people. Article X is the "States' Rights" amendment. It says: "This powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people." This Bill of Rights spells out some important freedoms. But they cannot survive unless the citizens enforcing them accept the individual responsibilities which are the price of freedom.

(Continued from Page Two) heavily populated sections are provided for examination by the Houghton newspaper editorial. The argument that financial support received in one part of the state from another is not charity but a fair expenditure is supplied with some facts to support it.

Detroit's prosperity resulted from Upper Peninsula raw materials. The oil, gas, coal and cement, as well as copper, iron and timber that have played such a large part in the growth of Detroit and other down-state centers were not produced in those cities, but the use of those products of nature, about which the Upper Peninsula, are the things that have contributed materially to making Detroit great.

Other industrial centers received similar admonishing by Publisher Rice.

"The fact that manufacturers are concentrated in a comparatively few places in Lower Michigan does not necessarily make them the benefactors of the state."

Grand Rapids, with its pride in its furniture industry, was also a target. "The factories merely shape into merchantable form the products that come from the forests north of the Straits." Rice reminded.

"In conclusion we humbly suggest that you don't sell the Upper Peninsula short. Some of us are self-sufficient but all of us are apt to minimize the contributions that our neighbors are making to promote the projects in which we are personally interested."

"As Mac West would say, 'Why don't you come up and see us sometime?' Maybe if we knew each other better, the future relationship would become less strained."

Livonia Adopts Dog Ordinance

Dog owners in Livonia are required to obtain a license for their pets by the time the animals are four months old under the city's new dog ordinance.

Applications for licenses must be made at the police department by December 1 each year. All licenses expire on November 30 of the year following issuance.

Licenses are issued for a two dollar fee. Six-month licenses, issued to dog owners who move into the city or purchase a dog after May 1, cost one dollar.

The fees cover the service to the public and the enforcement of the ordinance.

Applicants for licenses must furnish proof that their dog has been immunized against rabies within four months prior to application.

The new ordinance provides that the police chief may, if the situation demands, direct that no dogs, including licensed animals, may run at large in the city.

Dog owners will be notified of any such period of restriction in their newspapers. The period must be specified by the police chief and may not exceed six months.

Owners of licensed dogs impounded by the dog warden are promptly notified that their animal is being held. Unlicensed dogs seized by the warden are held three days before being destroyed.

The new ordinance stipulates that kennels operated within the city must be periodically inspected by the dog warden. Boarding kennels require a \$25 license fee. The ordinance was drawn up from a study of effective ordinances recently adopted by other cities and from a model ordinance prepared by the National Institute of Municipal Law Officers.
