sidled by other "experts" to make it an administrative impossibility. The bill is said to favor more probationary camps.

Economic facts of legislative life cannot be overlooked. The state budget is a large sum of money. The state financial situation is a chief concern of many lawmakers.

Much of Michigan's income is derived from taxes which shrink noticeably when business drops off. Returns from sales taxes and business receipt taxes would reduce overnight should there be a recession.

If this should develop, the legislature would prefer not to touch spending \$14 million when it might be argued that \$5 million would do as well.

"Temporary uneasy peace exists behind bars," said Austin McCormick in his latest article. It could easily be broken with new and more serious riots if conditions that caused previous uprisings are not rectified.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE PROHIBITING ARRANGEMENT OF ICE BOXES AND REFRIGERATORS ACCESSIBLE TO CHILDREN THIS CITY OF FARMINGTON, MICHIGAN:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful in the City of Farmington for any person, firm or corporation to place outside of any building, structure or dwelling, in a place accessible to children, any abandoned, unattended or discarded ice box, refrigerator or any other container of any kind which has an air-tight snap-lock or other locking device thereon, without first removing the said snap-lock or other locking device or doors from said ice box, refrigerator or container.

Section 2. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof be subject to a fine not exceeding five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, or to imprisonment for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or to both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court. Each day such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder.

Section 3. This Ordinance is declared necessary for the preservation of the peace, health, safety and welfare of the people of the City of Farmington.

This Ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington, on December 21st, 1953, and will be taken up for final consideration at the next regular meeting of the Council of said City on January 18, 1954.

Prisoners have no one to lobby in their interests. If legislative action does not meet minimum living needs, no one should be surprised at their revolt. Their fate is interwoven with politics, economics and other factors beyond their control.

The governor is stuck with accepting the recommendation of the commission he just appointed. To refuse would be to invite its members' resignations.

The legislature is stuck with the dilemma of beginning a prison construction program now, or facing blame for future riots which MacCormick says must be expected.

Inmates are stuck in red tape. After two years of investigating, they face the possibility that investigations will start all over again. In the meantime they exist in cramped quarters, seasoned criminals with first offenders, inmates with "normal" prisoners. Insufficient activity; insufficient medical care, and certainly insufficient rehabilitation programs.

Taxpayers are stuck with the bill. Whatever is decided, they will pay the check. If the decisions of the legislature are wise and made in time to remedy a situation long overdue for action, they can take some comfort from the knowledge that a social situation that no one is proud of has at last been dealt with in a sound manner.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE MOVING OF A BUILDING OR STRUCTURE FROM A POINT OR LOCATION OUTSIDE OF THE CITY LIMITS TO A POINT OR LOCATION WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS AND PROHIBITING THE MOVING OF A BUILDING OR STRUCTURE FROM A POINT OR LOCATION WITHIN THE CITY TO ANOTHER POINT OR LOCATION WITHIN THE CITY

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, MICHIGAN: DEFINITION: The term "building" means and includes any structure, framework or housing and includes tanks, receptacles, reservoirs, and containers for the storage of commodities or other materials.

Section 2. MOVING BUILDINGS INTO THE CITY. No person, firm or corporation shall move or attempt to move any building as defined in the preceding paragraph from a point or location lying outside the limits of the City of Farmington to any point or location lying within the limits of said City.

Section 3. MOVING BUILDINGS WITHIN THE CITY. No person, firm or corporation shall move or attempt to move any building as defined above from one point or location within the City of Farmington to another point or location within the City of Farmington.

Section 4. AIDING, ABETTING, ORDERING, TAKING PART. Any person, firm or corporation who shall order any building to be moved contrary to the provisions of Section 2 or 3 hereof or who shall aid, abet or take part in such illegal moving or attempted moving shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance.

Section 5. CONTINUING OFFENSE. Each and every day that a building is permitted to remain in the City at a location to which the same has been moved contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, shall constitute a separate and distinct offense and shall be punishable as such.

Section 6. PUNISHMENT. Any person, firm or corporation found guilty of a violation of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be subject to a separate offense, by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

Wildlife Faces Parasite Danger

Behind the beautiful and peaceful screens of forest vegetation, a constant battle is waged between nature's wildlife and the diseases and parasites which attack it.

Because of this situation, Earl C. O'Roke, University of Michigan professor of forest zoology, has conducted many studies on wildlife diseases. He has found, for instance, that ducks suffer from "antrax", deer from lungworms, and geese from lead poisoning. In many cases these attacks prove fatal.

Much of his research has been conducted under auspices of the U-M School of Natural Resources, celebrating its 50th birthday this month.

During the thirties, many Michigan ducks were afflicted with a mysterious "malaria-like" disease which killed off a good number of both the wild and domesticated birds, and it still afflicts them with varying degrees of intensity. "Through studies conducted at the U-M Biological Station on Douglas Lake, Professor O'Roke found that the disease was transmitted by the "native black fly". A common source of infection proved to be the "cattail", or live wild ducks used by hunters as decoys.

Hives are funny to some folks, but not to the sufferer.

Dr. Kenneth P. Mathews, assistant professor of internal medicine and assistant in allergy in the University of Michigan's Health Service, reports:

"Some patients have a severe form of hives which can be most uncomfortable and occasionally dangerous."

Big mosquito-bite looking welts, called "skeels" by doctors, can create a frenzy of digging and itching reminiscent of Chinese torture. And some acute attacks are associated with vomiting, nausea, diarrhea or abdominal cramps.

You might be allergic to aspirin or penicillin; your system might not be able to tolerate shrimp or strawberries; or you might break out in an itching rash at the very sight of your neighbor.

Dr. Mathews, in assessing the importance of determining the cause of hives, suggests that the sufferer keep an accurate diary of all the foods or drugs he took prior to each attack.

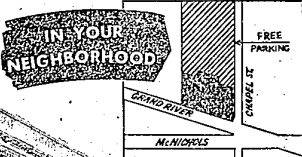
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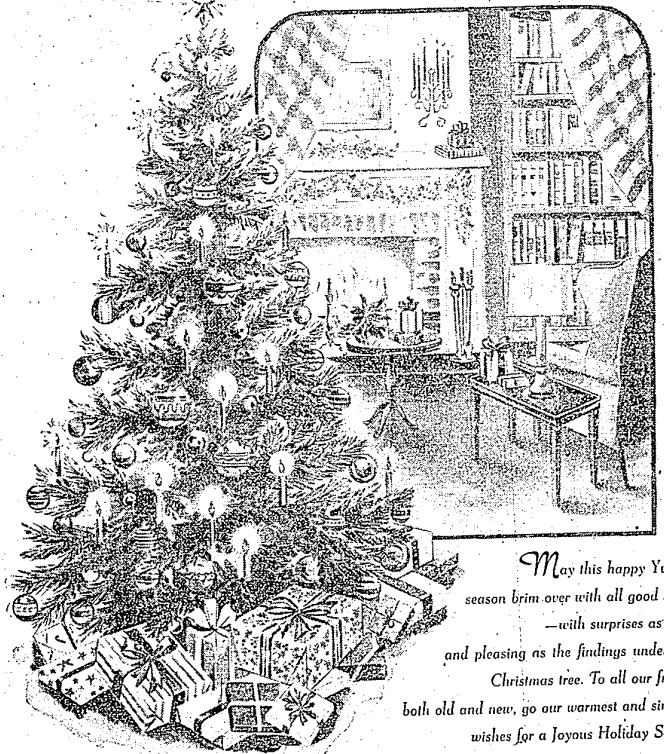
