supports a plan calling for an increase of 100 men to the police roster. Of these 100 would be patrolmen, two would be assigned to detective duties, four would be used otherwise.

"This will cost about \$550,000. Gov. Williams believes the money should come from the general fund, not from gas tax sources, and is ready to propose such action to the new legislature.

More patrolmen, better roads, are accepted as part of the solution to the problem of increased traffic deaths.

OFFICERS URGE CORRECTION OF SEX LAW FLAW

The Legislative committee representing Michigan law enforcement agencies has vigorously opposed a proposed legislation to amend the sex deviate law to prevent a recurrence of a recent Oakland county case in which a sexual psychopath could some day be released on his present confinement without fear of trial for the crime of murder.

The committee, meeting at State Police headquarters in East Lansing, represents the state associations of circuit judges, prosecuting attorneys, chiefs of police, sheriffs and the attorney general and commissioner of State Police.

The Oakland County case has aroused considerable concern and has been brought to the attention of members of the legislature to plug a loophole in the law.

The defendant, Donald V. O'Brien, charged with the slaying of a Pontiac woman, was committed to the Ionia state hospital for treatment as a criminal sexual psychopath. The flaw in the law which it is now sought to correct permits his complete release if later adjudged cured. The committee asks that a defendant in such a case be subject to trial for the crime of which he is accused after his discharge from the hospital.

Other matters acted upon included several proposals which it is hoped to have introduced at the next session of the legislature to strengthen the provisions of the law governing sexual offenses by older persons upon those 16 years of age or under and to increase penalties.

Four bills which the committee sponsored or endorsed at the last session of the legislature and which passed in the house but died in the senate, will again be introduced. They are:

Authorize prosecuting attorneys to administer oaths in the taking of voluntary statements and also give the attorney general power to issue subpoenas.

Require defense attorneys to file in advance the addresses of all witnesses as well as the names, which is now required.

Permit probate judges to waive jurisdiction in the cases of minors under 17 who are charged with misdemeanor traffic violations.

Increase penalties for offenses included under the common law.

The committee offered its support to any legislation which may be introduced to provide centers of rehabilitation where alcoholics would be placed for indeterminate sentences instead of sending them to state prison or the Detroit House of Correction.

portant factor, is the driver. If record highs in traffic fatalities are ever to become recedents, it will take the combined efforts of policemen, road builders, private citizens.

"Books on Wheels" will bring local library service to some 25,000 of Michigan's \$16,000 rural children and adults who have no such service at present.

Two "Trailblazer" bookmobiles are now on order by Michigan State Library service. They will be sent during 1954 to local library units which have promoted community plans, programs and support.

Money, counsel and books will move, under a new plan, from Lansing to local areas where it is needed. Key to securing the aid is initiative in a locality. Areas showing outstanding interest are first to receive this concrete encouragement.

Purpose of the development program is to show needs and potentials of libraries and to encourage counties without libraries to support a book and information service locally.

"Only 23 of 88 Michigan counties make library service available to all residents, with minimum service provided in some of these," says Mrs. Loretta D. Fyan, State Librarian.

"A good library available to every Michigan citizen is a fundamental need and is essential to the improvement of the state's economic and cultural standards," the chief librarian asserts. Referring to the areas barren of libraries as "deserts," Mrs. Fyan outlined her agency's program: "to make every effort to bring books and information to 'deserts' as quickly as possible."

"Wheeled" libraries will roll starting in April.

Three areas have been selected for 1954 activity: Arenac County or Saginaw Bay, Grand Traverse County, Marquette County.

The Iosco County Library Board is cooperating to extend its services into Arenac to serve Marquette county, the city libraries of Ishpeming, Negaunee and Marquette, as well as the county board, are working together.

Regional library service is the aim if next spring's effort in the Grand Traverse area. State librarians hope they can demonstrate an operation that can be expanded to include Antrim, Benzie, Kalkaska and Leelanau Counties as well.

Development of the bookmobile program is possible through action of the 1954 legislature. The law was amended so certain balances could be transferred to the jurisdiction of the State Board for Libraries and to demonstrate regional service.

In 1954, about \$56,000 will be used for this purpose.
