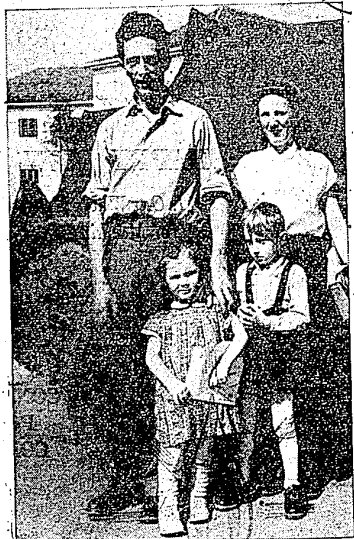

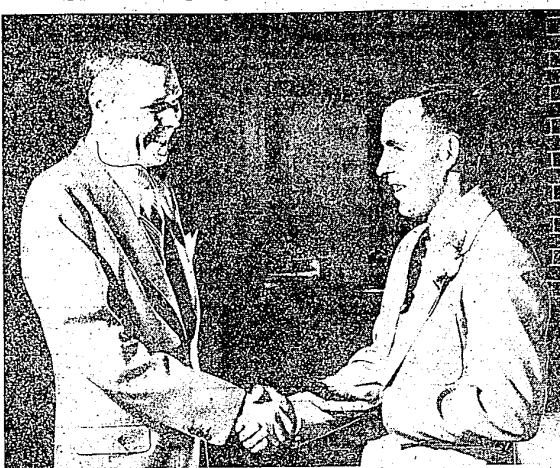
Three young girls representing the Neighborhood Sunday School sang sweetly at homes in the neighborhood of the church last Sunday evening. They were well received.

Fish, Game Aided By Flood Projects

About the turn of the century, the best thing a man could do with a swamp on his land was to drain it and turn the land to agricultural use.

Most everybody agreed in those years that drainage and reclamation were the best answers to the questions of proper land use.

A number of federal agencies were also put to work at the business of drainage, and in the early part of this century, swamp and marsh removal, river straightening work all helped in the matter of land development.

But then a period of questioning set in and a growing conservation movement began to realize that drainage could be carried too far.

Too much drainage cut heavily into wildlife stocks and, coupled with widespread land-clearing and timber cutting, could break the chain that green vegetation held on the earth to turn large areas of land into dust bowls.

Today, the national conservation movement is involved in innumerable small flooding projects aimed at bringing back some of the lost marsh area so necessary to a balanced wildlife population.

A number of these flooding projects have been completed in Michigan and others are under construction.

Often, small dikes and a single adjustable level concrete dam are enough to block a trickling stream and back up water over a large area.

Such work has added materially to both fish and game aspects of Michigan's conservation movement.

Farmers have their choice, suggest Michigan State College game specialists: Spend a few dollars now on dustproofing haymows or grain bins - or cash in their insurance policies after the fire.

Judge Hulett Warns Drinkers

Judge Hulett this week made another appeal to all motorists to cooperate with the holiday season safety program aimed at reducing accidents due to drunk driving. "By this time," the Judge said, "there can hardly be a motorist in Michigan who has not noticed the safety slogan 'Drunk Drivers Go To Jail' as used on posters, by newspapers and over the radio. Thus, there is no excuse for all motorists not making special transportation arrangements" whenever they attend holiday celebrations.

In explaining the drunk driving problem Judge Hulett urged each motorist who contemplates driving after drinking to consider the following points:

(1) Some of the worst drunk driving accidents are caused by motorists who have had just enough to drink to give them such a feeling of exhilaration that they drive faster than they should and take dangerous chances in passing.

(2) Drivers with still more to drink begin to lose their ability to control the car with the result that they get on the wrong side of the road or drive in the path of other traffic.

(3) Drivers with even more to drink lose more and more control, fail to react to traffic situations and sometimes drive into parked cars, trees, and telephone poles.

(4) Drunk drivers who are so drunk that they creep along the edge of the road at slow speed may be less hazardous than drivers less drunk who tear along the highway at high speed in an exhilarated condition. But, even the slow moving drunk driver may pull in front of high speed traffic or hit a pedestrian.

(5) Perhaps the drunk driver in his beginning stages of drunkenness is the greatest problem because he is the most dangerous. He does not realize that he is drunk and because his exhilaration makes him think he is the cowboy of the highways.

(6) Too much alcohol is a two-edged sword. In the first place it gets the driver into a traffic emergency - a jam he would not have gotten himself into if he were sober. In the second place it robs him of his best reaction and best judgment, thus making it much harder for him to get out of the traffic emergency he has created - whereas if he had been sober he might have been able to stop in time or dodge in time to avoid the accident his traffic violation is threatening to produce.

(7) Drunk drivers seem to expect sober drivers to get out of their way. But the sober driver is caught by surprise when it is often too late to stop or dodge in time and he has no way of knowing the other driver is drunk until after the accident.

(8) Attending holiday celebrations, sometimes results in a driver leaving late for another engagement. Being in a hurry compounds the fact that he has been drinking - and sometimes the desire to make up time gets him into trouble.

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Holiday Hints On Appetizers

Those holiday meals you prepare deserve a good start. And good starters run the gamut of appetite provoking foods, from oysters on the half shell to various high flavor preparations of meat, fish, vegetables and cheese.

When preparing canapes keep them quite small, just large enough to be eaten in one or two bites, advises Katherine Hart of Michigan State College's institutional administration department. Since long standing spoils most of them you'll want to prepare them not more than 30 minutes before serving, she adds.

A true canape always has a base for the savory morsel of food. The bases may vary from bread to puff paste. Crackers and pastry bases should be crisp.

When toast is used, select day-old close textured bread. Swedish rye bread or pumpernickel are excellent for this purpose. Slice the bread very thin and cut it into desired shapes with cookie cutters. Toast it on one side only by sauteing it in a little butter in a hot skillet over low heat, until it is lightly browned. Spread the topping on the untoasted side.

With melba toast, dip each piece in the white of an egg and place it in a 150 degree oven for drying. This forms a resistant coating and makes it less absorbent, explains Miss Hart.

You can choose from various canape butters such as anchovy, chutney, lobster, shrimp, garlic, pepper, sardine and mushroom.

Easy to fix spreads include cucumber, chipped beef, peanut and bacon, deviled ham, liver paste and finely chopped lobster or crabmeat blended with chopped celery and moistened with mayonnaise.

Hot canapes of ham, chicken or crabmeat spreads (with or without cheese) are heated under a slow broiler.

Hors d'oeuvres is the term used to describe savory little appetizers or relishes other than canapes. Unlike canapes, they are not served on bases of toast, bread or crackers.

Morinated cauliflower, artichoke, celery cubes, mushrooms or asparagus tips are possibilities for the hors d'oeuvre tray. Whole shrimp with tails left on, served with cocktail sauce are always a good choice. Tiny croquettes, tartlets, small pasties or miniature turgens must be served hot.

Broiler oysters or stuffed mushrooms add a subtle piquancy to an appetizer assortment. Tiny frankfurters and sausages may be broiled in a turn and mounted on cocktail sticks. Or dip small frankfurters in cornmeal batter and fry in deep fat.

good thing for the morale of the nation.

14. The present Administration will suffer much opposition to attempts to reduce tariffs if profits decline or unemployment increases.

15. The Administration and the Labor Leadership will try to revamp the Taft-Hartley Bill during 1954; but bad strikes are coming.

16. I am no weather prophet, but experts expect a warmer winter for the eastern portion of the U. S. and a colder Florida.

17. Canada will continue to boom during the first half of 1954, but this may be a good time to take profits on Canadian investments.

18. The above may also apply to southern California and its airplane and movie industries. Both may have reached their peaks for the present.

19. Automobiles will be harder to sell and easier to buy during the first half of 1954. Both the automobile stocks and the cars will be in less demand. There will be more bargains in used cars, discounts on new cars, especially cars of the "independent" manufacturers.

20. Florida may have killing frosts during the next few months. This will cheer up California, Arizona, and Texas.
