**Motorists Warned To Stay Sober**

Farmington City and Township Police are urging all motorists to make a special effort during the New Year's holiday to cooperate with the local authorities in reducing drunk driving accidents.

Joseph DeVriendt, City Police Chief, and Irving Yakes, Township Police Officer, stated that every effort will be made to cut down the expected high toll of accidents.

Both city and township police will make a check on bars and taverns in the area during New Year's Eve.

The visitation is designed to impress patrons with the importance of careful driving.

"It is only natural that our department should make a special effort to apprehend drunk drivers at a time of the year when there are a great many more celebrations than at any other time," DeVriendt stated.

The Chief warned that drunk drivers will go to jail and they will lose their privilege to drive.

Officials added that every effort has been made to warn motorists of the consequences of drunk driving. Bar and tavern owners have cooperated by placing safety posters and table tents in their places of business, and the press have continually promoted the safety program.

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**INDUSTRY AGRICULTURE WATER WONDERS**

**MICHIGAN**

"Water wonderland" will be the theme of the Michigan entry in the 1954 Tournament of Roses parade on New Year's Day. Using 200,000 live flowers and featuring 100 floats, the spectacular float will paint a floral picture of the state's industry, agriculture and vacationland. Based on a booklet about Michigan to follow the parade theme of "Books in Flowers", the gorgeous floral procession will be dominated at the rear of the float by two bronze Spartan statues, serving as book ends and each holding a spear flying the MSC pennant. The figures, 17 feet tall, represent the statue of "Sparta", a landmark on the MSC campus. Between the giant figures will be three enormous books in flowers, the volumes separately titled "Industry", "Agriculture" and "Vacationland". These will be entirely in varicolored chrysanthemums. In front of the books will be seen a factory building and its auto, a sailboat on a Michigan lake, a barn and silo and, sitting under a fruit tree in bloom, Michigan State's Donna Mae (Dee) Means, this year's "Miss Big Ten".
