

State Permit Required For Keeping Game Longer

Sportsmen are reminded that wild game can be kept in cold storage only 60 days after the close of the season in which the wildlife was taken, the conservation department notes.

After that date, a permit must be obtained from the local conservation officer that authorizes keeping the game a longer period.

This means that after January 9, anyone with pheasant or squirrel meat packed away in a deep freeze must obtain a permit from the conservation department.

For grouse, permits will be needed after January 15, for bear after January 29, and for deer after January 30.
