Prospects are bright for the new year, according to reports given by leaders at the Seventh-Day Adventist church at Sabbath services on January 2.

Educator For Jan. 18

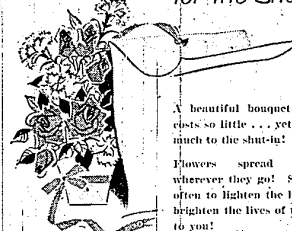

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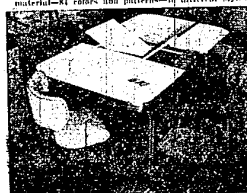
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
