

# Varsity Loses, S. V. Connects At Clarenceville

S. Lyon Beats Varsity J. V. Wins By 46-29

The Clarenceville Trojans dropped their sixth straight basketball game as they bowed to a South Lyon quintet, 45-34, last Friday. The loss marked Clarenceville's second at the hands of the Lions this season.

In the first period, the Trojans fell behind by an 11-9 score as six different Lions dropped counters through the basket for a two-point lead.

## SKIPPERS WIN OVER FARMINGTON 57-44 FRIDAY

The Farmington Falcons suffered a humiliating defeat at the hands of Waterford Skippers last Friday, by the score of 57-44.

Though this was the first league loss for the Falcons, Farmington still is in first place with a 3-1 record, but one more defeat in league play will knock them into a first place tie.

Farmington took the floor against Waterford last Friday night with all the confidence in the world that they would come home with another league victory.
