FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR FORMER METHODIST PASTOR

Dr. Sidney L. Eva, former pastor of the Farmington Methodist Church and professor of church history at the University of Michigan, died at his home in Roseville, Mich., on Monday afternoon at the Jefferson Avenue Methodist Church in Detroit. Burial was in White Chapel Cemetery.

The present Farmington Methodist Church was constructed while Dr. Eva was pastor. To his coming to Farmington, Dr. Eva served churches throughout the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. He also served as pastor at Marine City, Detroit and Mt. Clemens.

Dr. Eva formerly served as president of the Methodist Home for Children and was a trustee of the Home at the time of his death. Born in England, he was graduated from London University before coming to Michigan in 1903. Dr. Eva was 74 years old.

BAPTIST MINISTER PLANS PICTURE SERIES ON HAITI

Third dimensional stereograms will be presented at 7:30 p.m. Sunday, January 31, at the Farmington Baptist Church, according to Dr. Gordon Northrup, pastor.

These will give a realistic picture of the life of the nationals of Haiti on the island of Tortue (the Turtle) and in the region of Port-de-Paix as well as Mole St. Nicholas, where Columbus landed in the new world.

Mr. Northrup himself was a visitor early this year in the Republic of Haiti, which is celebrating the 150th anniversary of its Declaration of Independence. The slides which will be shown were taken during the pastor's journey through the hinterland, where he observed the work being done by Wallace Turnbull of the Ebenezer Baptist Mission and of his trained native pastors and Bible women.

Mr. Northrup, as the anthropologist of the visiting party, is being consulted by mainland churches regarding the methodology being employed among the nationals and peasants of the island.

The series of the travelsogue will be continued Sunday evening, February 7, at the same hour. For those who miss this series there will be an opportunity to hear a shortened lecture at the Berkeley Baptist Church given by Dr. Northrup Friday evening, February 18, at 7:30 p.m.

First, I got to thinking I'm kind of a 'Brandy-Ke-Carrying' dog. I put out along the streets of Farmington, only instead of dishing out brandy for the aid of others, I'm dishing dimes.

"Funny thing about it is, when it's time for aiding others, people are up and thank them, the money Saturday when they saw me doing my bit because I wanted to, most folks cooperated and really made the sheekies rattle in the can.

"On our stops in the stores along the main drag, I went into the butcher shop, and there was a little youngster getting his first haircut. Was he howling! I trotted right over, and when he saw me sit up with the canister under my chin, he forgot all about his hair of the barber's shears, and wanted to see everybody put money in the doggy's canister. Nice haul, we made over a buck in that place.

"In other stores, if people didn't notice me, I made my presence known by doing a little shimmy with the forepart, then the hindpart, rattling the can in the shake - and before I had a chance to sit up and thank them, the money was in the slot. One man in Kriegers thought I was so cute, that it was worth more than a couple of dimes, so he put in a dollar. I'll forgive him the 'cute' since he was so generous.

"Most of the ladies shopping that day were pretty smart. They know how kids love dogs, so they gave all their change to their children to put in my canister. I made the kids happy and it made me happy too.
