


Pvt. Pat Bradley Completes Course At Ft. Knox

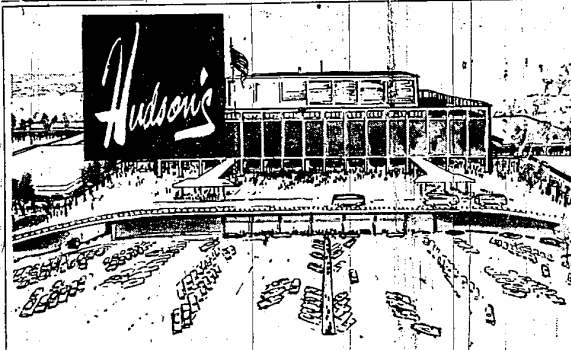
The specialized course trained the student in maintenance of tracked and wheeled vehicles. It consisted of conferences, demonstrations, practical work, performance tests and written examinations.

MADONNA COLLEGE FACULTY MEMBER RECEIVES AWARD

Sister M. Raynolds, CSSF, head of the English department at Madonna College, was nominated for the Honorary Membership in the International Mark Twain Society. She will receive the Certificate of Honorary Membership which is one of the most valued and important awards which the Society has to bestow. This membership is not available to the general public, but is conferred on an author in public recognition of his contribution to literature.

The award was given to Sister Raynolds for her dissertation entitled "The Patristic Influence on Chaucer," which revealed that this fourteenth-century English poet was greatly influenced by the Church Fathers, especially by St. Augustine.

Sister Raynolds was granted the Doctor of Philosophy degree at the Catholic University of America last June. She received the degree with English as major, and Latin and American literature as minors. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree at the University of Detroit and her Master's Degree at the University of Notre Dame. At present Sister teaches English courses at Madonna College.
