All-Observer basketball player, Dave Carlington, 6-4 and 165 pounds from Westland, joined John Glenn High School, became the sixth player to accept a college scholarship at Eastern Michigan University.

Carlington, who led the Glenn Rockets to the regional all-stars before bowing out to Romulus with an 18-4 season record, joins five others who have cast their lot with the Hurons and Coach Al Freund.

Previous tenders were signed by Larry Waus, 6-6 forward from Ypsilanti; Craig Smoak, 6-6 forward from Brooklyn, N.Y.; Bob Ervin, a 6-8 all-star from Avondale; Brian Schubert, 6-7 All-Borders City Conference; and Ted Hipscher a 6-4 all-state guard from Finlay, Ohio.

Carlington, considered "an excellent leader" by Freund, averaged 22 points a game as a senior and 16 as a junior. His single-game high was 33 against Garden City East.

He averaged over 15 rebounds a game and had a high of 23 against Garden City West. He holds 11 school records, including the most points in a season of 453.

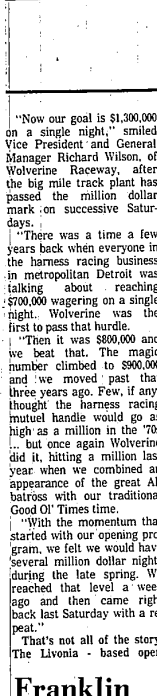

Turf Tips, Quips

"Now our goal is \$1,300,000 on a single night," smiled Vice President and General Manager Richard Wilson, of Wolverine Raceway, after the big mile track plant has passed the million dollar mark on successive Saturdays.

"There was a time a few years back when everyone in the harness racing business in metropolitan Detroit was talking about reaching \$100,000 wagering on a single night. Wolverine was the first to pass that hurdle."

"Then it was \$500,000 and we beat that. The magic number climbed to \$900,000 and we moved past that three years ago. Few, if any, thought the harness racing mutual handle would go as high as a million in the '70s, but once again Wolverine did it, hitting a million last year when we combined an appearance of the great Al-hairnes with our traditional Good Ol' Times time."

"With the momentum that started with our opening program, we felt we would have several million dollar nights during the late spring. We reached that level a week ago and then came right back last Saturday with a repeat."

The Livonia - based operation, Wolverine used the Detroit Race Course, could reach the new goal before the end of the current 82-night meeting on June 19.

Racing Secretary Bill Connors is receiving calls from trainers and drivers in the east and Midwest for stall space for the remainder of the meeting. The fifth purse increase, which boosted the invitations to \$12,500, and

the preferred events to \$8,000, is getting attention of those with better class horses.

Connors expects several stables to check in from California this week including Bobby and Jack Williams, the complete public stable of Doug Ackerman and several others who had great success during the recent Los Alamitos meeting.

Del Miller, who has several of his stars performing at The Meadows, plans on shipping in shortly to prepare for the Grand Circuit stakes in early June and also for the rich invitations.

Glenn Garney, who has charge of the powerful Castleton Farm stable, also is reported getting ready to move in with the entire string. Castleton is owned by Frederick Van Lennep, president of Wolverine Raceway and chairman of the board of the Detroit Racing Association.

Records continued to fall last week as Wolverine continued its record - making season.

Attendance is up 2.6 per cent with a nightly average of 7,146 contrasted to 6,967. This year's total is 337,308 against 348,353 for 50 nights a year ago.

Saturday's handle of \$1,009,068 boosted the nightly average to \$630,113 with a total of \$3,555,942. But the most remarkable statistic is that for the six nights of the week when the nightly average was \$718,551, highest in the track's 24-year history.

Wagering for the week soared to \$4,311,307, another high, and for the weekend it was \$1,848,579, second largest.

Saturday's crowd of 12,618, fourth largest for that night, shattered the all-time high for a nightly double pool with \$91,744 and had the second largest trifecta pool with \$87,502.

Skipper Gene Marx, a six-year-old from Ohio, proved lightning can strike twice in the same spot by winning the \$10,000 invitation for the second straight week.
