

# 10 Enter Schoolcraft Campaign

Ten candidates, including six from Livonia, have filed for Schoolcraft College's trustee election on June 11. Three persons will be selected from a field of eight candidates for six-year terms. Two candidates have filed for a two-year term on the college board. Candidates who have announced for the six-year term include incumbent Nannie Blatt, 1942 Parker, Livonia; Richard G. Buerk, 827 Westcrest Drive, Westland; Gerald L. Lunden, 9357 Marie, Livonia; incumbent Paul Kadish, 18687 Purlingbrook, Livonia; James Higgins III, 29419 Linda, Livonia; Noel J. Little, 41318 Windsor, Northville Township; Alfred D. Ringsred, 42465 Parkhurst, Plymouth; and Gerald L. Cox, 32761 Maplewood Garden City. Those seeking the two-year term are Ronald Cowden, 15577 Westbrook, Livonia, and Mark McQuesten, 14476 Summerside, Livonia. Three candidates are former Schoolcraft students including McQuesten, Miss Little and Ringsred. Mrs. Blatt and Kadish are currently serving on the board. Kadish was elected in

1971 to a two-year term which expires June 30. Mrs. Blatt was appointed to fill a vacancy on the board in January. Both Higgins and Cox have announced unsuccessful campaigns for the college board in the past. Cox was runner-up in the 1971 special election for a two-year term and in a 1963 election. He also was considered in January for an appointment to the college board. Three candidates are employed by school districts. Buerk is an assistant principal in Wayne-Westland. Cowden is a student activities director in Livonia, and Cox is a business department head in Detroit schools. Lunden is a former Livonia school board candidate, and works for the Wayne County Sheriff's office. Residents of the Livonia, Plymouth, Clarenceville, Garden City and Northville school districts will vote for all four vacancies on the board as well as on local school board candidates.

# 'Opportunity Fair' To Help Veterans

Veterans interested in learning about their rights and benefits are invited to the Madonna College "Veterans Opportunity Fair" May 24, from 2 p.m. to 9 p.m. in the dining hall of the Residence Building on campus, 36600 Schoolcraft, Livonia. Representatives from various service agencies will be available to answer questions on educational benefits, career counseling, and veteran rights. An individual veteran may be able to obtain up to \$8,000 in educational benefits. Veterans already on the coeducational campus or enrolling in a full-time program at Madonna will receive educational benefits of \$220 monthly for single veterans, or a possible high of \$330 in the fall for a veteran with two dependents. The fair is being planned with the cooperation of the new Veterans group on campus. The Madonna veterans group will also be giving help to other vets making the transition back to the academic life after a number of years in the service or other employment. Agencies represented will be: Veterans Administration; Michigan Employment Security Commission; Disabled American Veterans, U.S. Civil Service Commission;

Small Business Administration; U.S. Dept. of Labor; American Red Cross; Veterans of Foreign Wars; Michigan State Police; Michigan Veterans Trust Fund; and Michigan Air National Guard.

### Group Probes Nuclear Power

"Nuclear Power and the Energy Crisis" is the title of a forum being sponsored by the Wayne State University Chapter of DACE (Detroit Area Coalition for the Environment) on Wednesday, May 23 at 7 p.m. The meeting will be held in the second floor ballroom of the University Building on the WSU campus. It is free and open to the public. The fair is present will be representatives of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission and Detroit Edison; University of Michigan Physics Prof. Marc Ross; and Mrs. Mary Sinclair, co-director of the National Intervenor (the nationwide citizens coalition for safe nuclear power). A film titled "Are America's Atomic Reactors Safe?" will be shown for the first time in Detroit. Kim Siegfried, chairperson of WSU DACE, said "the Atomic Energy Commission has recently estimated that nuclear power plants will produce 60 per cent of our electrical needs by the year 2000 which will require the construction of 1200-1000 megawatt nuclear power plants. However, many responsible scientists and other individuals in this country feel that nuclear power may be the most dangerous non-remedial pollutant we now face."

### WSU Press Club Elects

Tim Richard, news editor of the Observer Newspapers, has been elected first vice president of the Wayne State University Press Club, which conducts an annual seminar for area newsmen and WSU journalism students.
