

Private School Zoning Sought

FARMINGTON
A new private school in Farmington, tentatively named the "Dudley School," is currently before the Farmington Zoning Board of Appeals.

Proposed site of the school is the old mansion at 23968 Drake Rd., the old family home of school board trustee Mrs. Elizabeth Brennan.

Mrs. Joan Dudley, recently elected to the first city council of the new City of Farmington Hills, is proposing the new school.

The site plan presented to the zoning board includes renovating the old home, with a tentative future building with 13 additional classrooms.

Mrs. Dudley said she has had "considerable interest" in the new school from both teachers and potential students, but did not elaborate on the educational aims of the institution.

She said approval from the state was also needed, as well as from the zoning board.
