Of all these cuts would be the cutting of the Federal pay roll. Of the approximately 20 million Americans now employed, four per cent, or about 1 out of every 25, are on the Federal pay roll.

Our American system would be more vital and our economy healthier if this were cut to 1 Federal employee to every 50 employees in private enterprise.

The present Administration has not really begun to carry out the expectations of the American public until the Federal pay roll is cut below 1,000,000 civilian employees. And the time to cut is now! However, it is apparent that such a reduction would be made unless citizens in the tens of thousands demand it of their representatives in Congress. We need to keep the statutory ceiling on the national debt where it is, and perhaps fix a percentage ceiling for the Federal pay roll at about 1,500,000 civilian employees.

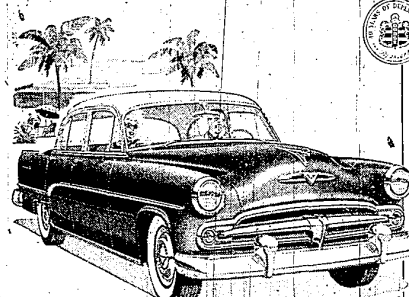
