HISTORIC MURAL  
TO BE UNVEILED  
AT P.T.A. MEETING

The High School P.T.A. Founders Day will be held Tuesday, February 16, in the new high school cafeteria. An unusual program has been arranged which will begin with a pot luck dinner at 6:15 p.m. After dinner and a bit of social conversation, the singing will come the unveiling of the mural panels that have been a special project of Mr. Glenn's advanced art class.

The mural which will be placed eventually in the school lobby depicts the history of Farmington from the time of the Shawnee Indians to the present. Scenes show the arrival of the first Quaker settlers, the establishment of the first industry — the Eagle Mill — a grist mill driven by water power, and located near the corner of Power Road and Grand River Avenue. There are the first churches, the old blacksmith shop, stage coaches and toll gate on the old plank road connecting Detroit and Lansing.

Do you know that the first Michigan man to enlist in the Union Army was a Farmington resident, that Farmington was a "depot" in the Underground Railroad, that Farmington was once virtually destroyed by fire?

The mural proceeds with the Owen House, the Town Hall and the Warner mansion down to the new high school. All the research on this project was done by students, as well as the layout and painting. It was a large undertaking, but now that it is completed it represents a valuable contribution to the high school and to the community. At the unveiling, the students who have veiled the mural will explain the various scenes portrayed and their significance.

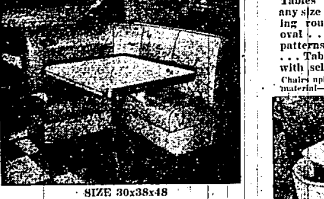

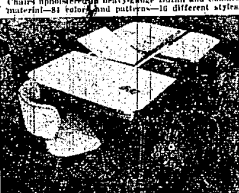

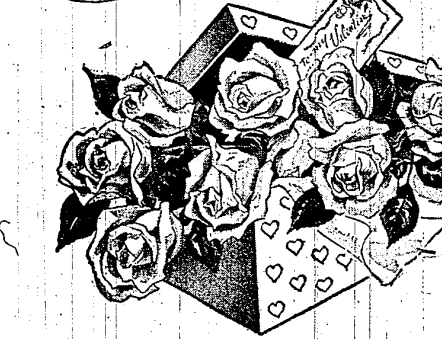
