Michigan's 24th annual State-wide Safety Conference will be headed by George A. Jacoby, personnel services director of General Motors Corporation. The conference will be held in Detroit April 20 through April 22 at the Sheraton-Cadillac hotel. Over 3,000 persons are expected to attend sessions on highway, school, home and industrial safety, in an effort to cut accidents and deaths in all these fields.

Petroleum Production Down From '52 Total

Petroleum producers took 12,234,513 barrels of oil and 7,084,626,000 cubic feet of gas from Michigan wells during 1953, the conservation department reports. This was a slight drop from the previous year. The oil total last year was 93 per cent of the 1952 production of 13,251,464 barrels and the gas total was 82 per cent of the 8,677,737,000 cubic feet produced in 1952.

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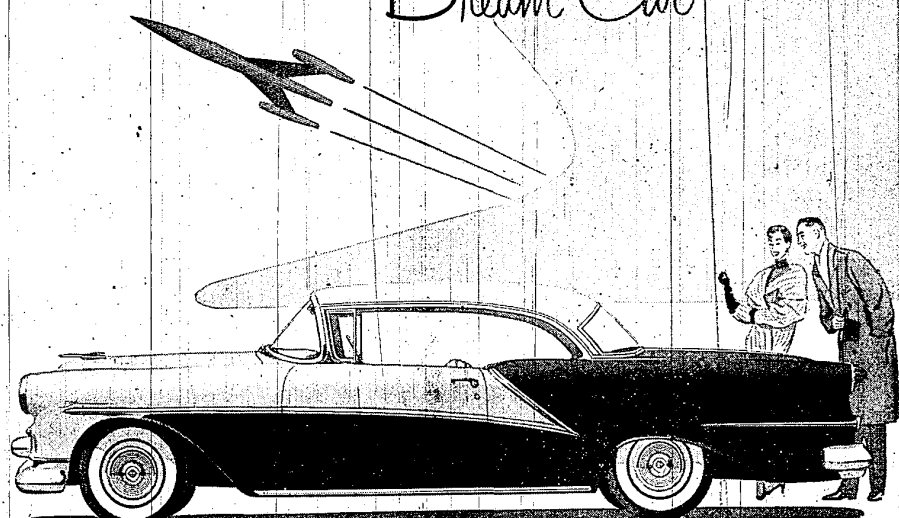
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
