Inflation and increased taxes.

We citizens might well tell our Congressmen that the rates we are suggesting at this time to bring their living standard in line with the value and importance of their service to our nation. I believe approved with two stipulations: (1) that Congress balance the 1945-46 Federal budget and thereafter keep the budget balanced; and (2) that a program of tax reduction and reform be continued until taxes are drastically lowered and are levied equitably, without favoritism.

Above all, we should tell our Congressmen that they must not legislate to themselves a tax-free allowance or adopt any other provisions that would set them apart from other Americans. Favoritism to any group, whether in taxation or governmental service, is not in keeping with the philosophy of Americanism and would eventually destroy our freedom system. Congressmen need to get bitten by the teeth of taxes just as deeply as the rest of us are bitten.
