Need Proper Bait For Best Results In Ice Fishing

Collecting Lure Part Of Sport

The cache necessary for a February fish fry is easily and happily obtained when the fisherman equips himself with the proper bait, according to Karl P. Lager, chairman of the University of Michigan Department of Fisheries.

And it's almost as much fun collecting the bait as it is to actually fish, he adds.

Alexander Smith, U-M botany professor and also an ice fishing enthusiast, has found that the most easily obtainable, baited, beetle larvae, found under the bark of elms, are the best.

For the purist who ties his own flies, Mr. Lager recommends a No. 14 of 16 hook. "Clamp on a piece of split shot," he advises, "and add a marbled feather streamer in the fish's favorite colors, red, yellow or white."

More than 240,000 teddy bear "Smokeys" were sold during the Christmas season, the U. S. Forest Service reports.

"Smokey Bear," symbol of forest fire prevention work, in the United States, has been an important help in promoting youth education work designed to combat forest fires.

A mother from Modesto, California, noted: "It is amazing how much more alert children are than grown-ups. There never is a lighted cigarette thrown from our car any more. If that happened, we'd really get hot."

RYDER SELECTED
 NEW M. S. C. DEAN
 OF ENGINEERING

Dr. John D. Ryder, 47, head of the electrical engineering department at the University of Illinois, has been named Dean of the School of Engineering at Michigan State College, effective July 1, 1954.

Dr. Ryder succeeds Dean Lorin G. Miller who retired July 1 last year. Dean Miller, a member of the staff since 1925, had served as dean since 1949.

The new MSC dean was born in Columbus, Ohio, and received his bachelor and master degrees from Ohio State University. His doctor of philosophy degree was awarded by Iowa State University.

After receiving the master's degree, Dr. Ryder was associated with the General Electric company in the development of electronics. In 1931, he became supervisor of the electronic section of the Buellier Motor Company's research laboratory in Cleveland.

In 1941, Dr. Ryder became assistant professor at Iowa State College, and in 1944, as full professor, was placed in charge of electronics courses. In 1947 he became assistant director of the Iowa Engineering Experiment Station. He became professor and head of the electrical engineering department at the University of Illinois in 1949.

Action Augurs Seaway Success

Congressman George A. Dondero declared that success now is in sight after a half century of effort in Congress to obtain authority for the United States to enter into a treaty with Canada in the construction of the St. Lawrence Seaway.

The House Public Works Committee, of which Dondero is chairman, last week voted to report the St. Lawrence Seaway Bill for consideration by the House of Representatives by a vote of 23 to 6. The measure had passed the Senate January 20, 1954.

"For the past 18 years, I have introduced a bill each Congress to authorize United States participation in building the Seaway. The bill passed by the Senate and now reported from the Public Works Committee to the House was introduced conscientiously by Senator Wiley of Wisconsin and myself."

"By getting the Seaway Bill out of the House Committee," Congressman Dondero pointed out, "Seaway proponents surmounted the most difficult hurdle of all in securing its enactment into law."

"During my entire service in Congress, and for nearly half of the entire period during which efforts have been put forth for its authorization and construction, I have fought in support of this legislation."

"As soon as the Committee vote was recorded, I telephoned the White House to inform President Eisenhower of the Committee's favorable action. I knew of the President's interest because earlier I had discussed the Seaway legislation with him personally."

"I told the President that I felt his personal support of the Seaway project as economically desirable and, even more importantly as vital factor in continental defense against aggression, had been one of the determining factors in the Public Works Committee's action."

"President Eisenhower, in his message on the State of the Union, stated: 'Both nations (Canada and the United States) need the St. Lawrence Seaway for security as well as for economic reasons. I urge the Congress promptly to approve our participation in its construction.' This being his position there is no question but what he will sign the measure when it reaches him."
