(Continued from Page One) who resigned from the Commission effective February 12. The Planning Commission recommended McFroy for the appointment.

Dr. Joseph H. Gahagan, representing the Farmington Area Recreation Commission, addressed before the Council to request that the Commission consider the possibility of a full-time recreation center to take care of recreational facilities, such as the skating rink, baseball diamonds and wading pool.

The city agreed to pay half the cost of the recreation center if the Township Board would agree to pay the other half. Gahagan stated that he would contact the Township Board.

A motion was made and approved to grant permission to the Michigan State Bank for the installation of a earth depositary on Grand River, 100 feet east of the curb line of Farmington Road.

The Council established a no parking zone on the east side of Power Road from Shawlawn on the south to Ten Mile Road on the north. "No parking" signs will be erected in the new zone.

A motion was also made and approved to reject all bids received for the 1954 paving work south of the Cut-Off and east of Gill Road, due to the excessive cost of improvements.

VISITING NURSE PATIENT LOAD SHOWS INCREASE

The Farmington Visiting Nurse Committee announced this week that during the month of January a total of 42 service calls were made in the city and township, including 11 new patients.

During the eleven months that the service has been available to Farmington area residents, 362 calls have been made. A portion of the cost for the service is borne by the patients with the balance coming from the Farmington United Fund and Community Chest.

LEGAL NOTICES

DOG QUARANTINE FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP

The fact has been established that dogs affected with rabies, a communicable disease known as "Rabies" have recently been at large within the County of Oakland, Michigan, and known to have bitten persons and animals. It may have come in contact with dogs as yet unknown in the Township of Farmington.

Notice is hereby given that any dog which has been bitten by a dog within the above named Township of Farmington shall be securely chained, confined, or secured and under physical control of his owner or keeper to prevent the aforementioned dog from attacking or biting any other animal or any person. No such dog shall be allowed to run at large without a responsible person to restrain him during the period of this quarantine. Dogs may not be removed from Farmington Township unless accompanied by a permit from the Oakland County Department of Health. Such permits may be secured from the Department of Health or its authorized agents on presentation of a certificate of vaccination against rabies within six months performed by a licensed veterinarian.

The attention of all owners or keepers of dogs within the above named territory is hereby called to the following sections of the Michigan State Laws.

Act 300 Public Acts of 1909 As Amended.

Section 1. It hereby makes the duty of all township boards of health to whom cases of rabies among dogs are reported to immediately investigate the same by means of a dog trap or trap and shall establish such temporary quarantine as may be necessary to prevent the spread of the disease and to make immediate complaint to the county or state health board in the manner provided in Section 4 hereof.

Section 2. The order of the board of health to restrain, confine, or secure any dog which has been bitten by another dog, or which has been exposed to the bite of another dog, shall be issued by the board of health as soon as possible after the date of the bite, and shall be in writing and signed by the board of health.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this act, or of a quarantine or regulation issued to restrain, confine, or secure any dog, duly established or issued by the board of health as provided in this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined a sum of not less than ten dollars nor more than 100 dollars, or to imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not less than one month nor more than 30 days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Act 300 Public Acts of 1927 As Amended.

Section 6. The county or district board of health or the board of supervisors, shall have and exercise the powers and immunities of a court of record in and for the administration of this act, and to redress any wrongs done to any person by reason of the non-observance or violation of the laws and regulations as provided in this act.

This quarantine shall be in full force and effect from and during the period between February 22, 1954, and May 22, 1954, inclusive.
