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University Women  
Plan Film Program

In commemoration of Brotherhood Week, Farmington Branch of the American Association of University Women will present, as a community service, three films for all interested adults at the Town Hall Thursday, February 25, at 8:00 p.m.

"One God," a film based on the book by Florence Mary Fligh, is a presentation of the major religious faiths, Protestant, Catholic and Jewish. It is a plea to eliminate the arbitrary boundary lines which divide people from each other as individuals and as nations. The film is composed of animated paintings, moving lines, realistic and abstract symbols; the music is an integral part of the drama.

"Picture in Your Mind" through the use of symbols, is a film which presents the earliest roots of prejudice and the reasons why any group, tribe, or nation thinks its way of life is superior to the other man's mode of living. In the second half a forestal plea is made to every individual viewer to re-examine his own mind to see whether his mental picture of the other man is distorted.

The Farmington Branch of the A. A. U. W. invites and urges all adults to attend this presentation, which will last approximately one hour. Coffee will be served following the films. There is no admission charge.
