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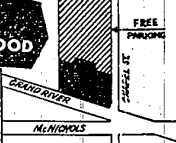

WINTER FAILS TO SLOW BUILDING IN LIVONIA

The 143 residential building permits issued in Livonia during January set a new winter-month high for home construction in the city.

Only four times since the city was incorporated in 1930 have more home permits been issued in one month.

But all four months that have bettered January's total were spring or summer months — the time of the year when home building is at a normal peak.

Figures released this week by Don Wilson, Livonia's chief building inspector, show that the 143 permits were for homes valued at a total of \$1,367,500.

Six commercial permits, for buildings valued at \$45,500, were also issued last month.

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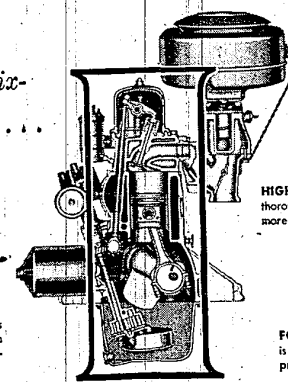

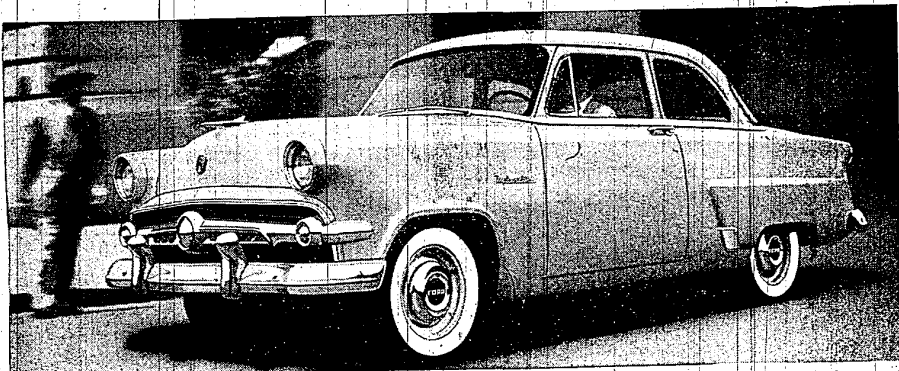
