## Farmington Man Becomes Jet Pilot

First Lieutenant Richard H. Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley J. Miller of 23309 Grand River, graduated in February 25 at the Laredo Air Force Base in Texas as a jet fighter pilot.

Miller completed 24 weeks of intensive training at the Laredo basic single engine school flying the propeller-driven T-28 and the P-51 jet trainer, the training version of the famed F-80 Shooting Star.

He was awarded his silver pilot wings by Col. W. M. James, Commander of the 3640th Pilot Training Group, in a brief ceremony held at the Laredo Air Force Base Theater.

He is now scheduled for additional advanced training in aerial gunnery, photo reconnaissance, or all weather interceptor tactics. Miller was a radar instructor at James Connally AFB, Texas, before entering flight training in January of 1953. He graduated from Farmington High School and attended Michigan State College where he majored in physical education and was active in the athletic program.

Miller is married to the former Shirley D. Lake, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Lake of 23760 Alyre Key.

## P.T.A. REVEALED AS RED TARGET BY F.B.I. AGENT

One of the most disturbing pieces of news to be made public in recent days, Congressman Dondero said last week, is that which revealed the Parent-Teacher Associations of America as the target of communist infiltration.

According to Herbert Philbrick, long an FBI operative inside the American Communist Party, in recent months the underground leaders of the reds have instructed Communist Party members to join P. T. A. Associations, and to work slowly and carefully in an effort to reach top official positions.

The FBI agent says that Communist Party members were warned that the P.T.A. Associations are well organized, and their leaders are not asking anybody to tell them what to do. Because of this, the communists were urged to volunteer for service in minor positions and to work their way up.

## Game Specialists Attend Conference

Twenty-five game specialists attended the Great Lakes Deer Group meeting last week at Rhinelander, Wisconsin, the conservation department notes.

Representatives from Minnesota, Wisconsin, Ontario and Michigan gathered at the north-central Wisconsin city and spent several days working out problems of deer management common to the North American whitetail range.

One important result of the meeting was to outline research projects planned or in progress so that each will complement, rather than duplicate, others in progress.

## State To Regulate Use Of Plant Killers

Use of chemical plant killers will be closely regulated on state lands this year to protect wildlife and natural forest areas, the conservation department notes.

In the past, indiscriminate use of herbicides on road and power rights-of-way has often caused wildlife problems and left public forest areas parched and unsightly.

Starting this year, use of the chemicals on state-owned lands will be authorized only after representatives from the conservation department's game, forestry and parks and recreation divisions have had a chance to see and approve the spraying project.

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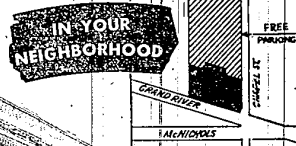
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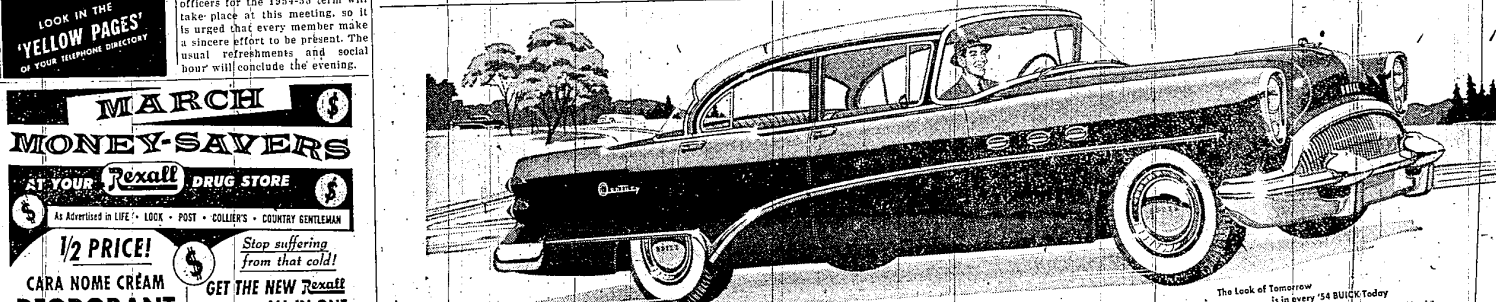
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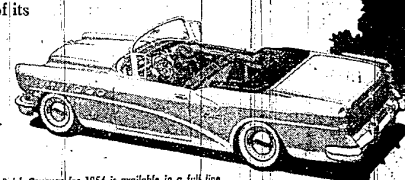
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
