Scouts Use Mobile Camping Unit

Counselor for the new Girl Scout Day Camp will be "signed up" until the first training session April 7. The day camp committee, headed by Mrs. John Hart of Oak Park, will need the services of 140 adult Scouts over 18 years of age to supervise the new camp.

New counselors must attend training sessions to be held Wednesday, April 7, 9:30 - 11:30, and Wednesday, April 21, at the same time at the Huntington Woods Lutheran Church; Wednesday, April 28, 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., and May 12, at the camp site.

Chartered bus service will be available during the camp sessions to counselors as well as campers. It is planned to designate schools as pick up points. The new camp is located at what once was called Smithman Park. It is at Carleton and Nine Mile Roads in Southfield Township, between Telegraph and Beech Roads. The use of the site has been provided through the courtesy of Mrs. A. G. Bradbury.

The new camp, to be known as Westwood Camp, will serve the entire council. Scouts from Brownies through Seniors, may attend for eight day sessions. A session will run for two weeks but meet only on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The first session is scheduled to start June 22. 800 girls are to be accommodated this year, which is an increase of 184 over last year when day camp was held at three sites.

Experienced counselors will receive advanced training Wednesday, April 7, 9:30 - 11:30 at the Huntington Woods Lutheran Church; Friday, April 23, 9:30 to 12:30 at the St. John's Episcopal Church, Royal Oak; and Wednesday, May 12, 9:30 to 2:30 at the camp site.

Mrs. Wendell Brown, Farmington, will give additional information and make arrangements for counselors from Farmington and Novi.

Camp directors for Camp Westwood will be Mrs. Thomas MacLroy, Ferndale; Mrs. Douglas Bain, Royal Oak; and Mrs. Walter Snow, Royal Oak. They will conduct the training sessions with the aid of special consultants.
