


CITY DESIGNATES DAYS FOR ROAD TESTS

City drivers are being requested this week to apply for road tests on Monday and Wednesday afternoons in preference to Friday afternoons if at all possible.

The request is made in view of the heavy traffic which usually occurs on Fridays. A new schedule on the issuance of drivers' licenses and the providing of road tests was set up last week, following an order from the Secretary of State's office, closing the business to all except residents of the city.

Officials stated that tests would be given on Friday afternoons, in better shape with at least an occasional use of time, MSC school scientists point out.




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



ing of the property. A vote of the persons present showed 20 opposed to the change and one in favor.

The second proposal discussed involved the Spike Manufacturing Company property. A petition bearing the names of 40 residents requesting the change was presented to the Board by Clarence Hoofnagle. A number of individuals present at the meeting voiced their objections to the amendment.

William Beer, attorney representing the Spike Manufacturing Company, stated that the plant was located on its present site prior to zoning, that the property in the area is zoned industrial and that the request is being made so that the property can be improved.

Various residents objected to the change at the time the ordinance of the building, plus the fact that it is in a residential area. A vote showed 18 opposed and five in favor of the change.

Kelly stated that the Board recommended the change because the property was not zoned as industrial on the original ordinance, in spite of the fact that it is in an industrial area. The ordinance was drafted. Another reason was the fact that the owner has declared his intention to improve the property provided it is permanent.

The third proposal discussed concerned the rezoning of the property at 32680 Northwestern from commercial to light industrial. A number of residents expressed the opinion that this section should remain commercial so that a future service center might be established. Harvey Trace, owner of the property, stated that he requested the change because he had an opportunity to lease his property for light industrial use.

Two petitions were filed protesting the action. One petition contained 15 names and the other seven names. A vote was called with 14 opposed and seven in favor of the proposal.

The recommendations on the three proposals now go to the County Zoning Board for approval. They will then be returned to the Township Board for final action.



Just A Reminder

Monday morning, March 22, a few minutes before our twelve mile road reached the intersection on Orchard Lake Road and Ten Mile Road, walking to catch her school bus, a west-bound car failed to stop at Orchard Lake Road (a spot intersection) and ran into the path of a south-bound automobile resulting in a terrific impact. The speed of both cars carried them completely off the road at the southeast corner of the intersection and into the ditch. One woman was killed and several persons were injured. The cars were damaged beyond repair. A pedestrian in the path of these skidding cars would have had little chance of survival.

Monday evening a car, the same day, while returning from our civic association meeting, traveling south on Orchard Lake Road, my wife and I came within inches of being struck by a speeding west-bound car at the intersection of Twelve Mile Road. This car did not even slow down, crossing the highway at a speed exceeding fifty miles per hour. This intersection is clearly marked with "Slow" and "Stop" signs in addition to a red flasher light which can be seen at least a mile away both east and west.

An amber light operates to north and south and it was fortunate for us that I heeded this caution light for I was going along enough to skirt to a stop and miss this car by inches.

I took out after this car and ran as fast as eighty miles per hour to overtake and stop this driver near Drake Road. I took his name, driver's license number and car license number and have signed a complaint in Judge Schuler's Court.

This was done as a private citizen. I know that I was taking a long chance in attempting to stop this car but felt justified because such recklessness must be stopped.

A private citizen has the right and duty to file a complaint against one who is guilty of a misdemeanor and has a right to even make an arrest where a felony has been committed in his presence.

When complaints are made, it must be understood that there will be no conclusive testimony and evidence that the offense complained of was committed by the accused. It is the duty of the complainant to be prepared to back up the evidence and testimony when the accused is brought into court.

All citizens can be of assistance to law enforcing agencies if they would take the trouble to file complaints against reckless, careless and incompetent drivers who are endangering safe lives and putting us on our highways.

The driver who is law-abiding only when a police car is in the vicinity will, if he thinks others are watching him, be more apt to obey safe driving regulations.

the voted increase for operation will decrease. It is expected to remain the same in 1955 and then drop slightly more in 1956 and 1957.

The total tax rate in 1953 was 26.5 while the estimated rate in 1954 and 1955 is expected to be 27.7. By 1956 the 1951 tax levy is expected to drop, allowing for the increase of \$3.00 per \$1,000 on the proposed bond issue without any increase in the total tax rate.

Officials pointed out that these rates are based on the 1951 allocation set by the County Equalization Board. They are also figured on an estimated equalized valuation of \$26,000,000 for 1951 and an increase of \$1,000,000 equalized valuation in each of the following years.

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
