REVEREND LINTON TO RE-APPEAR IN FARMINGTON

Without doubt the greatest series of meetings in the history of the First Baptist Church of Farmington came to a close Sunday night as Rev. John Linton presided in a full house. Just before the benediction was pronounced, Dr. Gordon L. Northrop, Pastor, announced that arrangements had been made for another series of meetings next year with the same speaker because of local reputation and popular demand.

Some accomplishments of the last year and some goals for the coming year were laid before the people. During the last year the attendance in both Sunday School and church has jumped approximately 100, a new bus valued at approximately \$5,000 was purchased, and the property to the west of the church has been acquired.

Plans are that in the year ahead around September 1 an additional Sunday School unit will be opened in the building to the west of the church, that a parking lot will be opened behind the house. Expectations are that the present growth will continue and that with these added facilities growth will approximate another 100 next year.

There is a wealth of fashion inspiration in the resort lines for 1954, in silhouette, in color, in fabrics, in types of clothes.
