The establishment of protective regulations on the moving of dwellings is an important step in the right direction. We believe that an additional step right direction. Building codes are common in every growing community. They are common because they are important to the safety and welfare of all the people.

The speed and thoroughness of these important steps will depend to a considerable extent on the vigilance, interest and cooperation of the residents. It's a job that should be done...let's get at it!

But in the final analysis it's up to you . . the driver! Campaigns can be conducted on a local, state and national basis. Enforcement of traffic laws can be stepped up and new safety legislation enacted. These programs are being carried out in many communities with encouraging results. But the final statistics are going to be written by you!

Every one of us is interested in reversing the rising toll from traffic accidents. We're interested as a community and we're interested as individuals. Why? Because it is happening here and it might happen to us. If we could but keep this fact foremost in our minds . . . if we could but include ourselves in the picture, traffic safety would be a rule, not just an urgent plea.
