

Choose Sewing Machine Carefully

Homemakers are confronted with a difficult decision when it comes to choosing a sewing machine these days, says Mrs. Josephine H. Lawyer, home demonstration agent for Oakland County. There are many types of machines selling at different prices and suited to different purposes. In response to the demand from families the country over, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has just issued "Choosing Your Sewing Machine" (H-38), an illustrated publication prepared by portable machines.

The bulletin includes information on the kinds of sewing for which the different types of machines are best suited. It also compares advantages and disadvantages of cabinet and portable machines.

Urge Functional Furniture Use

Is functional furniture a new idea? Is it all modern? How do you combine it with furnishings already in the home?

Homemakers will hear the answers in Tuesday, February 2, in the auditorium on the Michigan State College campus.

It's a part of the Farmers' Week program planned especially for women. Maxine Norberg and Mary Shipley of the JSC home economics related arts department will give information on the "What, How and Why" of functional furniture.

They'll demonstrate examples of room partition units, dual purpose units, high-low tables and other functional pieces.

Homemakers will learn of the materials and methods used to make furniture functional. Many women will be glad to hear what designates furniture as "modern" or otherwise. And women who feel that modern furniture is cold and lacks grace will gain tips on overcoming these characteristics.

On Tuesday afternoon, homemakers will see an outstanding demonstration on meat cookery by Mrs. Rosa Stanz, home economics director of the National Live Stock and Meat Board, Chicago.

Wednesday and Thursday programs for women will include features on family relations, kitchen planning, family health and world affairs. Climaxing the three-day women's program will be the Thursday afternoon style revue with 85 coats modeling the various styles they designed and made in their clothing classes at MSC.
