

Just A Reminder

Thomas Jefferson, in referring to New England towns (townships), once said, "They have provided themselves the wisest invention ever devised by the wit of man for the perfect exercise of self government and for its preservation."

"Towns" (townships) said Joel Parke, "have been the arterial system of New England through which has circulated the life blood which has invigorated, sustained and strengthened her, making her expand her religious, social, educational, benevolent and political institutions."

Township government in the State of Michigan is of the same pattern, with revisions, as town government established in New England colonies before the revolutionary war and further developed thereafter. It is the root, the solid basis of self government, a government of, by and for all the people.

The annual township meeting is set by Michigan statute on the first Monday of every April. It is when public business of the township is transacted. It is held in the Town Hall. It is presided over by the supervisor of the township. All matters are decided by majority vote of the qualified voters present. Here, once a year, we have the right and obligation to present our views and vote on issues of vital local importance. In recent years only ten to fifty qualified voters have been interested enough to be present. Are the rest of us too busy with personal business?

Isn't local government personal? It is true that our township officers are elected at the polls; that some public questions are decided at elections; but the annual meeting is still very important.

Township officers, our public servants, are entitled to your help and are entitled to know your feelings, your wants and your opinions if they are to do a job satisfying the majority of their constituents.

It is easy to sit back and find fault. Let's get off the sidelines and contribute our share to good government.

Remember that a small group or an organized minority could upset your apportionment if you are not there to have your say and to vote. Let's make our Republican form of government work in our own front yards.

40 new elementary classrooms, a classroom and gymnasium - auditorium addition to the new high school and the purchase of steel for elementary buildings, and for new equipment.

In approving the school issue, taxpayers voted to support their schools by paying \$3.25 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation as equalized for the years 1954 and 1955. The tax rate for 1955 to 1973 would be \$3.90 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation as equalized. The tax figure for 1954 represents an overall tax increase of \$1.25 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation as equalized over the 1953 figure.
