



(Continued from Page One) The proposal and to express their opinions. Moseman stated that he thought it was an excellent idea. The discussion next Tuesday will be the first that the Board has had on the proposal since it was made. Under the plan, a circular office would be constructed adjacent to the present Town Hall. The building, which would be located near Grand River and Farmington Road, contains four offices, a vault and lobby. It is estimated that the building would cost between \$25,500 and \$30,000 without a basement. The proposal also includes substantial remodeling of the Town Hall. The library would be moved to the location of the present township office and a kitchen would be deantiated in the library area. The stage would be moved to the east end of the building. The estimated cost of the remodeling would be between \$5,000 and \$10,000. The committee pointed out that the report is strictly a recommendation and is subject to change by the Township Board.

LOCAL ANGLERS TO HAVE CHANCE AT RAINBOW SATURDAY

Farmington anglers, the time draws near. Streams in 25 counties will open to rainbow trout fishing on April 10 in the annual extended spring season, conservation fisheries workers point out. The season is set by law to open the second Saturday in April and gives trout fishermen a chance to timber their casting arm before the general game fish season opens April 24. All Michigan's Great Lakes waters also will be open during the season. In the upper peninsula, certain streams in Alger, Egera, Keweenaw, Gogebic, Houghton, Chippewa, Luce, Mackinac, Marquette, and Ontonagon Counties will be open. Below the Straits, some streams will be open in Alpena, Antrim, Arenac, Benzie, Charlevoix, Emmet, Grand Traverse, Isocoo, Leelanau, Manistee, Mason, Muskegon, Newaygo, Oceana and Presque Isle Counties. Details may be obtained by contacting local conservation officers or by requesting a list of open streams from the department's fish division at Lansing, 26. WHEN EASTER COMES The date of Easter Sunday depends on the moon. In 325 A. D., when thousands of pilgrims had begun to travel on foot to shrines to celebrate the Re-urrection of Christ, it was decided to fix the date of Easter so these pilgrims could have the Holy Land and protection -- of the moon.
