Student Receives U-M Scholarship

Erickson was one of 152 recipients of fellowships and scholarships awarded by the University. He is a student at Michigan State College. The awards were presented to students from universities and colleges throughout the world on the basis of high academic standing. They will be effective in September, 1954.

Letters are already in the mail to the recipients of the awards, which include: 10 Horace H. Rackham Predoctoral Fellowships, \$1,750; six Horace H. Rackham Special Fellowships, \$1,200; 23 University Fellowships, \$1,300 to \$1,500; 15 University Scholarships, tuition for a semester; 18 State College Scholarships, \$850 granted to one student from each of the colleges in Michigan; and 24 Special Fellowships, from trust funds set up for fellowships and from gifts.

"We feel about this theme in particularly appropriate because Founders' Day, February 12, also is Lincoln's birthday," Denison said. It also was Lincoln who signed in 1862 the Morrill Act, which created the national system of land-grant colleges and universities.

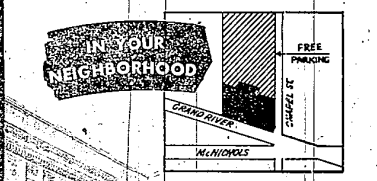

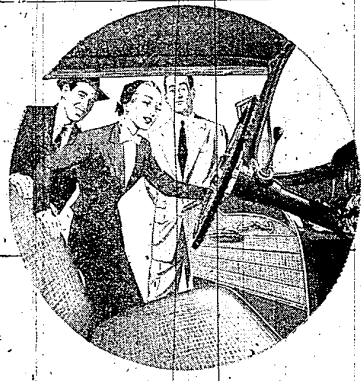

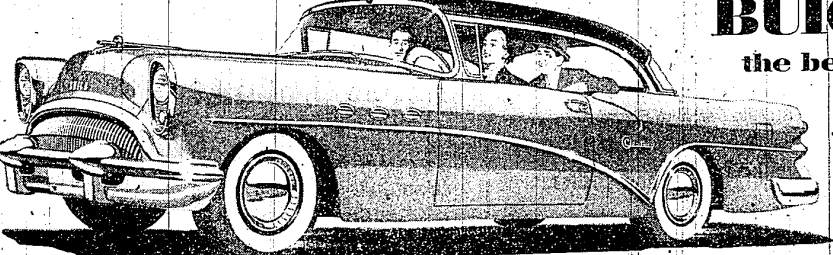
