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HARD PUNCHING MIDDLEWEIGHTS FEATURED FRIDAY

Moses Ward and George Johnson, two of the hardest hitting young middleweights in the business, meet in a scheduled round bout to be nationally telecast and broadcast from St. Nick's Arena Friday evening, April 16, on the Channel 4 Sports.

Starting at 10:05 p.m. (EST), the NBC television and ABC radio networks will bring to fans everywhere the "man-club" windmill style of Moses Ward, the sledgehammer technique of Johnson.

Moses Ward, a tough boxer rather than a fancy Dan, is fast becoming a TV favorite. He takes a punch without backing up, and he is a real fighter with a variety of effective punches and lefts. His recent TV appearance against Willie Troy was well lighted by a complete absence of clinches. Moses, turned 19 in 1950 and has compiled a total of 10 knock in 17 wins.

George Johnson, making his Friday evening TV debut, has a style similar to his opponent with a left hook that has racked up 10 knockouts.

In a recent outing, George battered favored Terry Moore and gave the ring his own winning a ten-round decision. This victory brought Johnson's win total to 20; 20 of them via the knockout route.

Farmington Thincads Show Strength In Field Events, Slump On Running

Farmington's track team lost the first track meet of the season to Romulus last Friday by the score of 73 to 35. The meet was originally scheduled for Thursday, but it was postponed due to a wet track.

In the field events, Roger Goers and Ron Sundrila finished one-two in the shot put, Dennis Mahoney won the pole vault, and Don Nichols tied for second place in the high jump.

In the track events, Farmington took two firsts, three seconds, and one third. Romulus swept the high hurdles, low hurdles, middle relay, and the 100 yard dash. Farmington won the 550 relay, took first and third in the 220, turned in 15:10 and has completed a total of 10 knock in 17 wins.

Ralph Peckham put on a terrific kick in the stretch to take second place in the half mile, and Dick Grisham came from behind in the anchor leg to win the 550 relay, for the most exciting events of the meet. Dick Goulet was high man for Farmington with 84 points.

Track scoring is on a 5-3-1 basis. That is, 5 points are awarded for first place, 3 for second place, and 1 for third place.

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27 Killed, 232 Wounded In 1953 Hunting Seasons

During the 1953 deer and small game hunting seasons in Michigan, 27 persons were killed and 232 wounded by hunting weapons.

A total of 671,000 persons purchased small game licenses. During those hunting seasons, 14 were killed and 171 wounded by firearms and 14 were wounded by snares and other devices, an average of one fatality per 48,000 hunters and one wounding per 3,900 hunters.

During deer seasons, 568,000 persons purchased licenses. Of this total, 15 persons were killed and 161 wounded, an average of one death per 36,000 hunters and one wounding per 2,900. The previous year, one person per 29,000 was killed and one per 3,200 wounded.

As in past years, the most dangerous problem was the hunter's own weapon or that of his friend. At least 15 of the 27 deaths were self-inflicted or were caused by members of the victim's own hunting party. An estimated 176 of the 232 woundings were caused the same way.
