Mrs. Farinel spoke to the group on China, with her main topic that of the binding of feet, for years an important custom of old Chinese people but now discontinued. She displayed a model of a bound foot, made for her by a Chinese woman.

The daughter of missionaries working in the interior of China, Mrs. Farinel spent the first 19 years of her life in China. She is the niece of Supreme Court Chief Justice Earl Warren.

Following Mrs. Farinel's talk, a brief business meeting and social hour was held.

CONCERT CHORUS

August Mackelberghe, Helzumborn organist, conductor, and composer, will conduct the Madrigal Club in concert scheduled for Monday, May 3, at the Detroit Institute of Arts small auditorium.

Singing with the 25-voice chorus will be Miss L. P. Nelson of 25925 Millbrook Drive, Farmington.

Highlighting the concert will be the premiere of a three-song cycle by Detroit composer Evelyn Lehman. Dedicated to the Madrigal Club, the cycle includes "At Dawn," "At Mid-Day," and "At Dusk," with words and music by Miss Lehman.

Miss Lehman received the French Medal of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1930 for her oratorio "Sainte Therese of the Child Jesus," which was performed with great success at St. Eustache and Rouen. She is also widely known for her "Southland Suite," which was performed in Detroit by the Metropolitan Opera Company in 1935.

In addition to Miss Lehman's work, the Madrigal Club will sing music of Rogers, Mozart, Elgar, Beethoven, Schumann, Miklos Rosta, three choruses from "Alice in Wonderland" by Fine and a group of folk songs and spirituals.

Proceeds from the concert will go into the club's established fund.

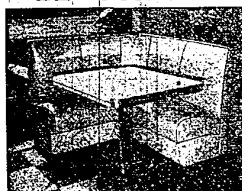

A son, James Andrew, was born April 15 to Mr. and Mrs. James Yull. Mrs. Yull is the former Charlotte Mathews.

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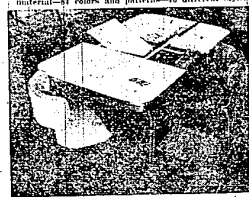


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
