## Falcons Defeat Waterford 5-1 In Game Friday

The Farmington baseball team downed Waterford, 5-1, last Friday, as Wayne Dryden threw a six hitter and batted in three runs to lead the Falcons to victory.

Farmington scored its first run in the third inning as Maki singled, went to third on Markham's hit, and scored as the catcher dropped Fawcett's third strike.

Waterford scored in the top half of the third on Kelly's double, an error, and an infield out.

The Falcons scored 4 runs to the bottom of the sixth as Dryden scored on an error which loaded the bases, and Dryden hit what would have been a grand slam home run which scored Rockefeller, West, and Jones. Dryden was called out for missing second base and was credited with a single.

The Falcons lost 6 to 1 at Southfield May 4.

## Waterford Wins League Meet

Waterford's thinclads broke three records while running away with the Inter-Lakes Conference Track and Field Meet last Friday.

Kerry Keating ran the hundred yard dash in 10.2 seconds, breaking the record of 10.3 set by Dr. Hahn of West Lake in 1952.

The two hundred yard dash record was broken by Ray Campbell, who ran it in 20.4 to clip one-tenth of a second off the mark set in 1953 by Keego Harbor's Singleton.

Keating, Laine Hetherington, Jim Holton, and Campbell combined to crack the half mile record by 1/100 of a second to 1:59.9 by Walld Lake. The old mark was 1:57.4.

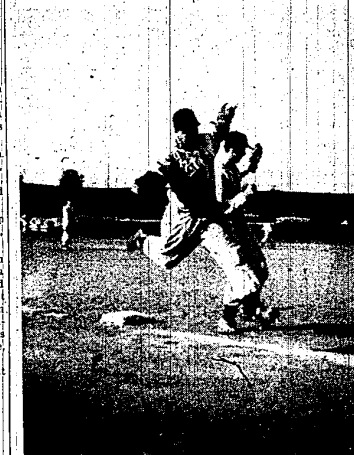
