Tax Rate For Fiscal Year 1954-55 Remains The Same At 17 Mills

\$238,099 BUDGET

A record \$28,009 budget for the fiscal year 1954-55 was formally adopted by the City Cohinel at a lengthy regular session held Monday evaning at the Municipal Building. The Council also approved a imotion that the city tax rate for the fiscal year be set at 517 per thousand assessed valuation, the same as has year. In addition to the regular budget, a total of \$545,000 has been set up for projosid boaded capital outlay. This includes financing of the sevare disposed plant, estimated at 3300-0000: off-street parking, estimated at \$175,000; new sever and water mains, estimated at \$5,000; and special assessment improvements, estimated at \$5,000.
