Milk Values High While Cost Is Low

Michigan homemakers can include milk among their penny-wise purchases.

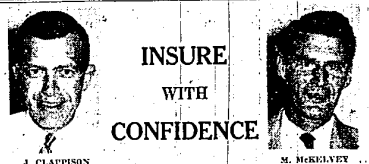
According to tables released early this year by the U. S. Department of Agriculture research service, milk and cheddar cheese are way out in front of all other foods as plentiful and economical sources of calcium, reports Robert Hershey, extension foods specialist at Michigan State College.

Everybody needs calcium every day. Besides building strong bones and teeth, calcium is needed for efficient heart and muscle function, as well as for proper functioning of the nerves.

Young growing children need more calcium than adults, but meals much too low in calcium are often selected by all members of the family. Studies show that homemakers are the lowest consumers of all, says Miss Hershey.

A calcium comparison on foods shows that one quart of milk gives as much calcium as 50 oranges, two large heads of cabbage or 27 pounds of meat.

Milk is an excellent and economical source of animal protein, too, Miss Hershey points out.

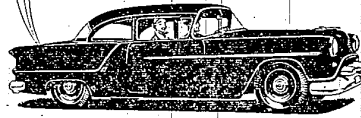

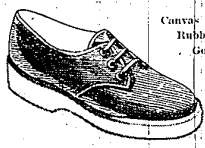
