### ECLIPSE, SUMMER'S ARRIVAL HIGHLIGHT JUNE SKY EVENTS

A solar eclipse, the official open-  
ing of summer, and the "dog star"  
approach to the earth is the line-  
up of stellar attractions for the  
month of June, says Miss Hazel M.  
Lush, University of Michigan as-  
tronomer and professor of astronomy.

On June 30, Northern Michigan  
will have an opportunity to ob-  
serve a total solar eclipse. Occur-  
ing at new moon phase, or when  
the moon passes directly between  
the earth and sun, an eclipse is  
total only when the moon is close  
enough to the earth for its shadow  
to reach the planet, Professor Lush

said. The width of the eclipse's shadow  
is narrow and this time will  
cover a path about 70 miles wide.  
Partial eclipse may be observed  
from the Arctic circle to Mexico  
and approximately 87 per cent  
of the sun will be covered for  
Southern Michigan viewers.

The eclipse will begin around  
sunrise on the morning of Wed-  
nesday, June 30, with the edge  
of totality at 6:09 a.m. It will  
end a few minutes past 7 a.m., but  
the duration of the totality phase  
is only one minute and 32 seconds.

Summer will officially arrive  
at 5:55 p.m. Monday, June 21, when  
the sun enters the Summer Sol-  
stice, or reaches its most northern  
point of the year. This will be our  
longest day, although probably not  
the warmest.

Among other June stellar at-  
tractions will be the close approach  
of Mars to earth, Professor Lush  
said. In beautiful Evergreen Gar-  
dens, sacrifice. 32340 Grand Ri-

On July 2 at 8 a.m. Mars will  
be a little less than 10 million  
miles from the earth, although it  
can come as close as 35 million  
miles.

**Help Wanted...**  
**DESTROY YOUNG MOSQUITOES NOW.**  
**SAVE ITCHING LATER**  
Don't be afraid of "picking on  
babies" when it comes to mosquito  
control, advise Michigan State Col-  
lege entomologists.

A little time spent on inspec-  
tion and wiggler killing now will  
save a lot of time and trouble  
later, entomologists say. The  
L. Jones and Walter Morosky,  
it's not too early, they note, to  
start "picking" around ponds,  
swamps, brush, and cesspools.

There are four types of wigglers  
in burrles, catch basins, ex-  
posed water troughs and even slow-  
running streams.

Spot the mosquito wigglers by  
their "periscope" and get busy.  
You will wear and tear on  
sprayers, screens and people later.  
If there are no fish to worry  
about - and they warn that DDT  
will kill fish - you can put a  
subsequent of 5 per cent DDT  
in kerosene on water surfaces for  
each five square feet of water.

If you use kerosene alone - for  
areas where fish live - the same  
hazard by DDT, then more treat-  
ments will be needed. Pyrethrum  
and kerosene larvicide also can  
be used for water containing fish.

In case the MHC entomol-  
ogists warn, should DDT be used  
on water to be used for cooking  
or drinking by men or animals.

After draining wet spots and  
spreading water treatment, then  
it's time to cut grass and treat  
shrubs. Use 2 pounds of 50  
per cent wettable DDT powder to  
50 gallons of water for an acre of  
shrubs.

**IN RING FRIDAY NIGHT**  
Eduardo Lausse, hard-punching

### Red Cross Ready For Tornado Here

If a tornado should strike any-  
where in Oakland County, the Red  
Cross would be working within 15  
minutes, Harold B. Eshler, Oak-  
land County Chapter, chairman,  
said this week.

Euler said the chapter's duty to  
swift action as soon as a dis-  
aster hits is part of its charter,  
and that the National Red Cross  
to get more help to the scene  
as soon as it can, if needed, its  
first action is to get the chapter  
ready.

"The chapter works in the  
area where the disaster happens  
so into action right away," Euler  
said. "They get in touch with  
police, firemen, and other govern-  
ment people and proceed to rescue  
and evacuate injured people. The  
Red Cross arranges to feed people  
who are homeless, get a roof over  
their heads and provide clothing for  
them."

"Meanwhile, if the disaster is  
too big to handle alone," he said,  
"word would go out to the Red  
Cross chapter in St. Louis and to  
the nearest army facility. In our  
case, Selfridge Field. While the  
emergency is on, nobody who  
needs food or clothes or shelter  
will be turned away."

After the emergency is over and  
the sick and injured are in hos-  
pitals, the homeless are fed and  
housed, comes the long work called  
"rehabilitation."

Families who have lost their  
homes or have heavy hospital bills  
may not have enough insurance  
or bank balance, or income to pay  
off these debts or get new living  
quarters can apply for aid.

The Red Cross repairs or rebuilds  
homes, provides essential furni-  
ture, or the tools and equipment  
that may be vital to a man's mak-  
ing a living - but only if he can't  
pay for them himself. Need is the  
basis for giving.

**GAMMA GLOBULIN**  
**WILL GO TO GROUPS**  
**TO PREVENT POLIO**  
Gamma Globulin, the blood de-  
rivative containing polio anti-  
body, will be available in Michi-  
gan again this year for the pre-  
vention or modification of paralytic  
polio. Dr. F. S. Leeder, di-  
rector of the state health depart-  
ment, said that he "anticipates gamma  
globulin to meet the needs of the  
state for the year."

This year the globulin will not  
be given to single family units,  
since there is no evidence that its  
use in this way last year either  
prevented any cases of paralytic  
polio or have increased the severity  
if they did occur.

The globulin will be used for  
"group" inoculations. A group  
is defined as being larger than a  
single family, such as a neighbor-  
hood, an apartment house, a church,  
an area or a district within a com-  
munity. It will be up to the full-  
time local health officer to deter-  
mine who will receive inoculations  
in his area. Before an entire com-  
munity can receive inoculations,  
approval must be obtained from  
the Michigan Department of  
Health.

Dr. Leeder stated that the dose  
has been made a little larger this  
year to provide a few extra anti-  
bodies for a better chance of pro-  
tection.
