### GETTING RID OF WASPS, BEES EASY WITH CHEMICALS

Here's how to deal with those wasps that build their homes too close for personal comfort:

For hornets, yellow jackets and mud daubers, spray or dust chlordane or DDT on the nests, suggests E. C. (Bert) Martin, Michigan State University entomologist. Put most of the insecticide in, and around the opening.

This is done at night—not only because it's safer—but because the wasps are more likely to be home.

You can then plug the openings of hornet and yellow jacket nests with a wad of cotton soaked with carbon tetrachloride and nudge the nest into a sack and bury it or burn it.

### SLENDER WOMAN HAS WIDE, FREE CHOICE IN CLOTHING

"The girl or woman who is tall and thin, even lanky, can rally fool the public into believing that she has a fashion model's proportions this spring, says Evelyn Schuchman of Michigan State College's department of clothing, textiles and related arts.

In choosing the right clothes, she can brush aside all the representations of "dolls" and "dolls" that her stout sisters must observe for best effects. If in harmony with her personality, the tall and thin individual can choose the striking, the bold and the dramatic. For she has one very important asset—height.

Since the long thin vertical line alone is no excuse for admiring, she can choose her clothes and accessories to add bulk and the individual feeling to her figure. She mustn't be too timid in her choices; imagination is the thing she needs.

The success of any costume for her begins with the right fabric. Wool is a natural choice for her because her body is long. Flannels are better than worsted gabardines and flannel twills which might look a bit too trim for her thin figure. In summer fabrics, the waif wears muscades, very wide white plaids, puffy seersuckers, coarse natural linens and stiff denim-like fabrics are for her. Quilted fabrics are a boon to give a rounded effect.

Since she is tall and thin, she has great freedom in choosing fabric patterns. Plaids, checks and bold stripes are all good. Large design units, widely spaced, give a dramatic effect and at the same time break up length and add the desired illusion of width. Tiny dainty patterns that may appeal to her feminine fancy must be judiciously avoided.

In color, imitations are set by personal coloring. She can select accessories that are large in scale.

In cut, the thin girl looks for an extended silhouette. She wants a long-sleeved coat, enormous collar, kimono sleeves, large cuffs at the wrist, bouffant or all-around pleated skirts, wide belts, yokes and large pockets—all are flattering to her.
