GETTING RID OF WASPS, BEES EASY WITH CHEMICALS

Here's how to deal with those wasps that build their homes too close for personal comfort: For hornets, yellow jackets and mud daubers, spray or dust chlordane or DDT on the nests, suggests E. C. (Bert) Martin, Michigan State College entomologist. Put most of the insecticide in and around the opening.

This is done at night — not only because it's safer — but because the wasps are more likely to be home.

You can then plug the openings of hornet and yellow jacket nests with a wad of cotton soaked with carbon tetrachloride and nudge the rest into a sack and bury it or burn it.

New Emergency Trailer Operated By Michigan State Police Post

The Michigan State Police have just placed in service a new field office and communications center on wheels equipped for use as a mobile emergency headquarters in time of need.

Telephone extensions within the plans were developed following the experience at the Port Huron plant tornado, when such a unit would have been of great value in directing rescue efforts and maintaining police control.

The 33-foot trailer contains four radio transmitters and a telephone switchboard with a capacity of five trunk lines and 12 extensions.

The transmitters with the regular networks of the State Police and Conservation departments, local police and sheriff's departments.

Telephone extensions can be rigged to other emergency headquarters, such as the National Guard and Civil Defense.

The office section is complete with typewriter facilities and a telephone.

A public address system with four speakers is mounted on the roof top. An antenna tower with a height of 45 feet telescopes into a length of 20 feet and fits over so that it can be carried flat on the roof.

If regular power is not available, auxiliary power for both radio and lights can be supplied by a 5,000 watt generator carried in the truck tractor that pulls the trailer.

The telephone system, installed by the Michigan Bell Telephone company, may be operated over commercial central office facilities or by local battery power supply.

All of the work of building, desks and installing equipment, with the exception of the telephone was done by State Police employees. Little new equipment being used. Joseph A. Childs, State Police Commissioner, said much of the equipment had been service in previous emergencies but had to be assembled at the scene piece by piece in whatever makeshift locations could be utilized.

Childs foresees a broad use for the trailer in providing a headquarters not only at disasters, but whenever a large number of police are mobilized for any purpose.

The trailer is said to be the most complete unit of its kind in the country.

NARROW SKIRTED DRESSES STAGE SPRING COMEBACK

In the grouping are the cool dressings and shirtwaist dress, both looking new since they have thrown off flares. But there are many other pretty dresses with lace-derived necklines, high fitted mid-riffs worn with and without belts. If not the bateau, look for the white collar — either a schoolgirl peter pan or a large almost shroud-embracing collar.

In choosing the right clothes, she can't brushe aside the representative "ideas" and "don'ts" that most stylists must observe for best effects. If in harmony with her personality, the tall and thin individual can choose the striking, the bold and the dramatic. For she has one very important asset — height.

Since the long thin vertical line is no cause for admiration, she can choose her clothes and accessories to add bulk and the needed horizontal feeling to her figure. She mustn't be too timid in her choices; imagination is the thing she'll need.

The success of any costume for her begins with the right fabric. Wool is a natural choice for her because of her body. Flannels are better than worsted gabardines and flouret twills which might look a bit too trim for her thin figure.

In summer fashions, the waffle weave, pique, very wide waist plique, puffly seersucker, coarse natural linens and stiff denim-like fabrics are for her! Quilts and fabrics are a boon to give a rounded effect.

Since she is tall and thin, she has great freedom in choosing fabric patterns. Plaid, check and bold prints are all good. Large design units, widely spaced, give a dramatic effect and at the same time break up length and add the desired illusion of width. They don't patterns that may appeal to her feminine fancy must be put gently aside.

In color, limitations are set only by personal coloring. She'll want to select accessories that are large in scale.

In cut, the thin girl looks for an extended silhouette. She'll want long, pointed, coat, enormous, cuffs, kimono sleeves, large cuffs at the wrist, bouffant or all-around pleated skirts, wide belts, yokes and large pockets — all accentuating to her.
